Mill City and Gates under the direction of Geo. Veteto, vice president, pooled their efforts and raised \$500 towards a suggested 1952 quota of \$2,500. Mrs. Tenny Moore and Paul L. Reiling collected \$65.84 for the Community Chest in the Detroit area. Mrs. Violet Wallen boosted the interests of the Community Chest by \$30 in the Mehama area last year.

As of January 1, 1953, the Marion County Community Chest had \$14,434.14 which it allocated to the Boy Scouts, Camp Fire Girls, Girl Scouts, Oregon Chest, administration and campaign funds. The Oregon Chest was proposed for the largest allocation from this fund, Boy Scouts ranking next.
