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Farm Union Oppose Initiative Change

Strong opposition to all efforts to tamper with Oregon's initiative and referendum laws was expressed in a number of resolutions adopted at the 43rd annual convention of the Oregon State Farmers Union which held its three day session at Salem last week. Delegates professed to see in the current efforts of the legislature to amend the initiative and referendum laws the opening gun in another sales tax campaign which the Farmers Union has always vigorously opposed.

Other resolutions adopted opposed the Pelton dam bill, the 20 per cent surcharge now being imposed by private utilities, and the tidelands oil lands to the three states of California, Texas and Louisiana.

Other resolutions favored the civil rights bill now before the legislature, an appropriation for a new state dental school providing the new school would graduate a larger number of dentists than are now being graduated; and the extension of social security laws to cover all farmers.

Another resolution dealing with educational television urged the state to hold on to the two TV channels which have been set aside for Oregon.

A conference of various organizations dealing with bills now before the legislature, to be sponsored by the Farmers Union, was endorsed in another resolution.

Delegates made it plain that they are not backing down in their stand

for 100 per cent support prices. They adopted a resolution supporting President Eisenhower and Secretary of Agriculture Benson in "any efforts they made to carry out the 100 per cent support program of the Farmers Union".

Another resolution objected to throwing open welfare rolls to public inspection as proposed in a bill now before the legislature.

Richard Moeller, Cornelius, Washington county, farmer was re-elected president of the organization. Roy Rutschman, Marion county, was elected vice president. Board members elected are Mrs. Percy Lamb of Monmouth (re-elected), Warren

The annual reports showed the affairs of the organization in a flourishing condition. Membership doubled during the year and the financial report revealed a surplus in the treasury.



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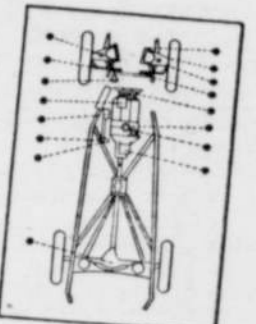


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
