Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Bressler went to Salem Sunday where they were dinner guests at the home of his sister, Mrs. Cora Corbett.

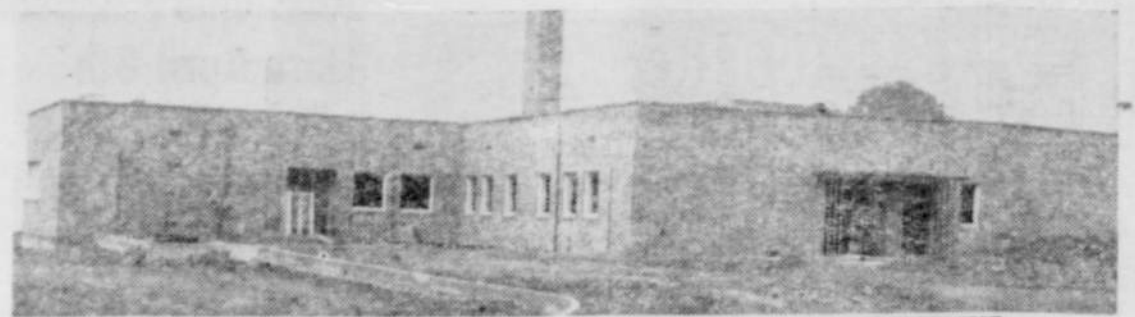

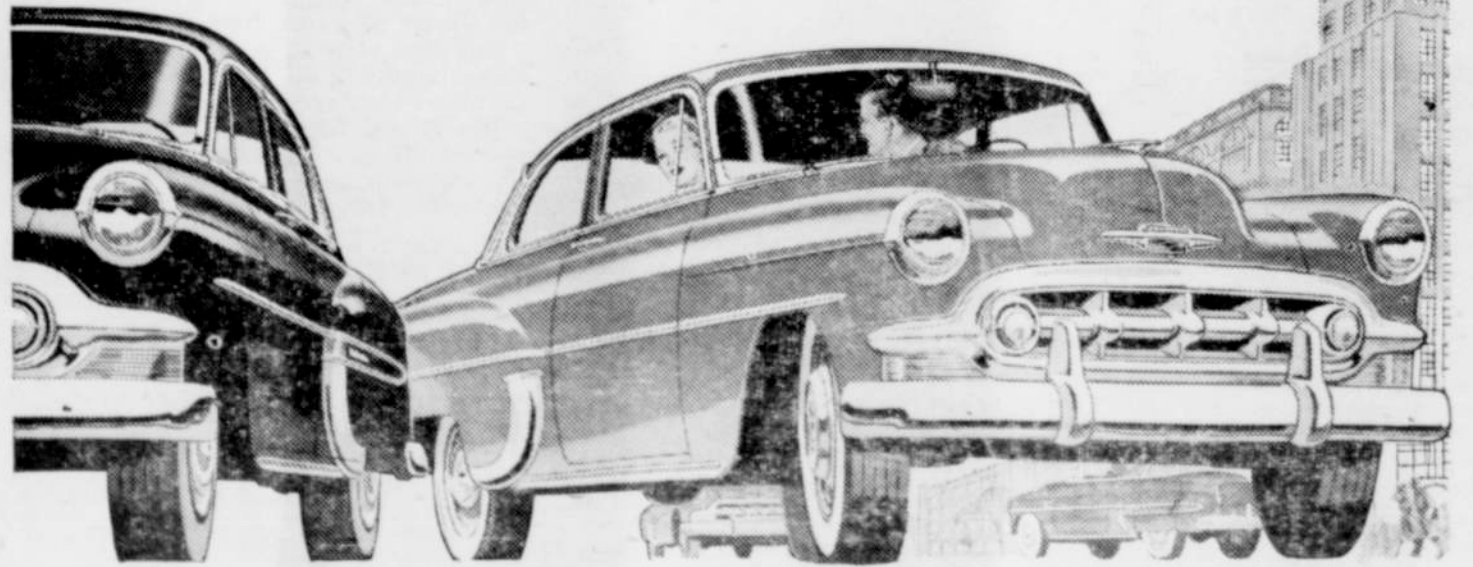
