nine Bonebrake, formerly Jeannine Bentley, spent her vacation with her husband at Parks Air Base in California.

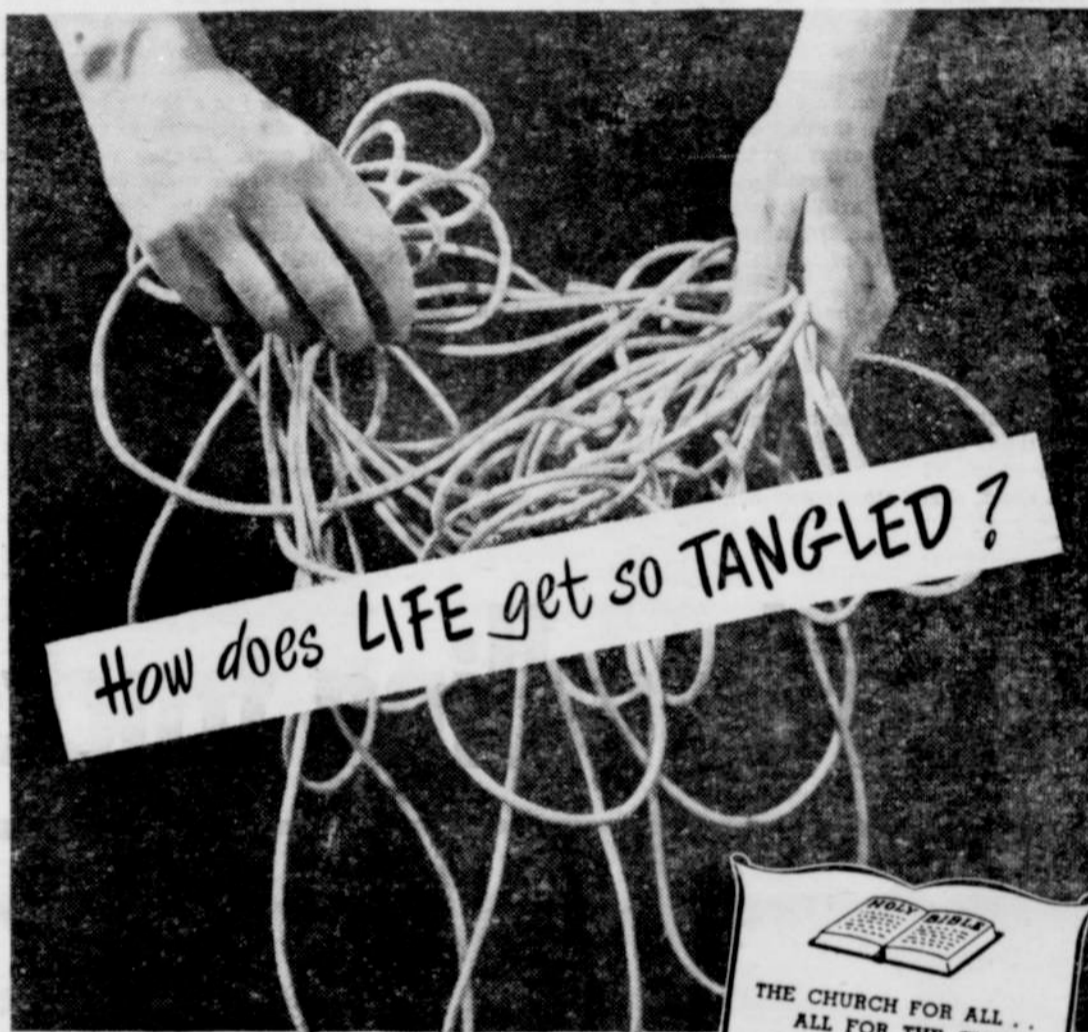
