How Can a Person not versed in the subject tell a good road from a bad one?

It Isn't As Easy as you might think. A road may look very strong, yet be weak. It may look inadequate, yet be competent to handle all the traffic that will use it.

There Are Three things necessary to construct a good road, students at a famous engineering college are told by one of its wisest professors. Those three things are: One, a good foundation; two, a good foundation; and three, a good foundation!

You Can Prove for yourself that a road is no better than its foundation. Take an ordinary sponge rubber mat, place a sheet of paper on it; then stand on the paper. What do you get? A broken, cracked or indented sheet of paper. Then place an identical paper on a firm floor and stand on it. The result is—undamaged paper.



This is Conclusive evidence that it is the floor that holds you up, not the paper. Similarly, in a road it is the foundation that bears the traffic, not the upper surface. That surface merely provides smooth rolling and protection against water.

The Foundation of a road must be built up where the natural soil is not firm enough. A sub-base course of crushed stone is often used to spread traffic weight over a larger area of the sub-soil. Whatever method engineers decide to pursue, the main point is that the under-side of the road has got to be strong.

Always Remember, the road surface you see is only an umbrella covering the foundation. That surface was not built to handle traffic by itself; it must have the proper foundation under it. Given a firm foundation, it will take the weight of traffic many, many years to have any effect on the highway.


