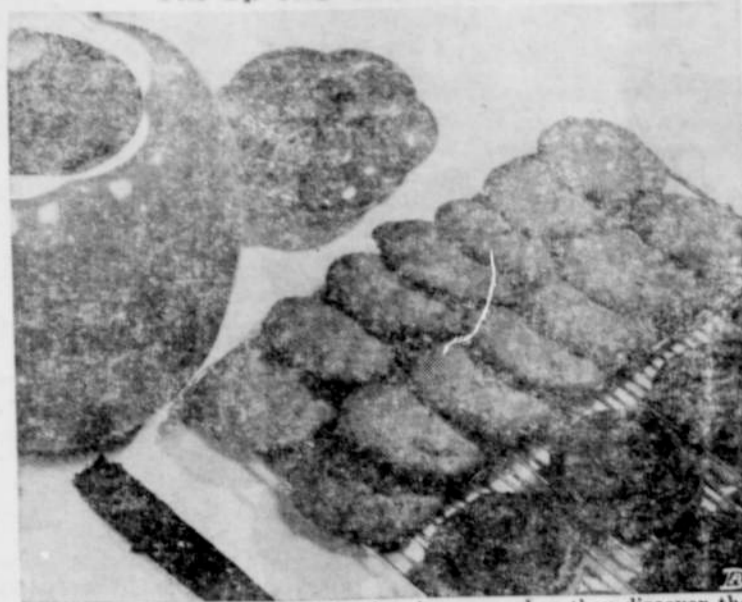

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### DOUBLE CHOCOLATE-NUT COOKIES

2 one oz. cakes unsweetened chocolate  
1/2 cup shortening  
1 cup beet or cane sugar  
2 eggs  
1 1/4 cups sifted all-purpose flour  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 teaspoon baking soda  
1/4 cup milk  
1 1/2 cups coarsely chopped walnut meats

Melt chocolate over hot water; set aside to cool. In mixing bowl cream shortening and sugar together until light; beat in eggs one at a time. Blend in cooled chocolate. Alternately add sifted dry ingredients and milk. Stir in nutmeats. Drop batter by teaspoonfuls about 2 inches apart onto ungreased cookie sheet. Bake in hot oven (400° F.) for about 10 minutes. Cool on cake rack. Makes 5 dozen small cookies.
