The stockmen already have, just the same as all other citizens."

Other bad features of the bills include one that would give stockmen with grazing privileges virtually non-cancellable leases, with the further privilege of transferring them to other parties, which is a most extraordinary landlord-tenant arrangement.

"The national forests were established mainly for the protection of the west's vital watersheds in the public interest, and for the orderly production and harvest of timber," said De Witt. "Grazing is a privilege, just as is the seeking of clean, healthful outdoor recreation on the national forests by some 30 million Americans every year. Grazing interests already have all the rights they should have. We feel every citizen who loves the outdoors should write his congressman and his senators in opposition to these bills."
