DID YOU KNOW . . .

There's no wonder your highways are jam-packed. In 1947 it was predicted the USA would have 46 million vehicles in use by 1970. Today, there are 53 million vehicles—7 million more than we were expected to have 17 years from now.

Motorists are most bothered on country roads, says an Automobile Manufacturers Assn. survey, by narrow roads and curves.

In cities, motorists are most disturbed by pedestrians.

Motor transport moves everything grown on the farm.

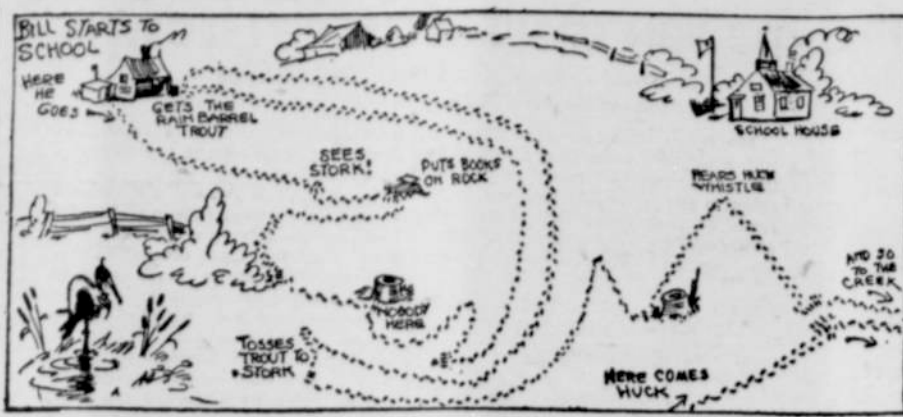
Since 1949 rubber roads have been laid in 17 states. Massachusetts has 300 miles of all types.
