There's no wonder your highways are jampacked. In 1947 it was predicted the USA would have 46 million vehicles in use by 1970. Today, there are 53 million vehicles-7 million more than we were expected to have 17 years from now.

Motorists are most bothered on country roads, says an Automobile Manufacturers Assn. survey, by naryow roads and curves.

In cities, motorists are most disturbed by pedestrians.

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


