There's No Such thing as a permanent road. A highway is a piece of construction, like a house or any other building; if you fail to watch it constantly, if you fail to make those repairs necessitated by weather and wear, you're in trouble!

The Surface of a road serves as an umbrella. That is to say, it pro-



tects the foundation and sub-grade; it screens off the water, which strikes in the form of rain, sleet and snow. Thus, the foundation cannot be attacked directly.

The Cost of maintaining each mile of a 20-foot wide, cement concrete highway may run from \$275 to \$550 per mile per year. If the road is a bituminous mix, it will average \$575 a mile per year, and if un-treated gravel, the price may average

\$875 per mile per year.
This Sounds High to the average citizen, of course, But consider this: the original cost of a cement road is estimated at \$35,000 per mile. If you owned a house worth \$35,000 would you consider an annual maintenance cost of \$275 to \$550 as high?
