

Group Identifies Old Photographic Plates

About a dozen people gathered at the home of Mrs. J. R. Geddes in this city Monday afternoon.

Mrs. Mathilda Sigmund Jones was among those present. Over sixty years ago a brother of Mrs. Jones', Andy Sigmund, took a great number of photographs in the vicinity of Mill City, Gates, Mehama and Stayton. These photographic plates, being of the old time glass type variety, had never been developed. These are now the property of the Archives division of the state of Oregon.

These plates have been loaned to Mrs. Jones by the State Historical office and she is attempting to identify places and people on them. With this in mind, she has had various gatherings, of which this was the twenty-seventh. To date over 90 per cent of the pictures have been identified.

Mrs. Geddes, who is 98 years old and Mill City's oldest citizen, was able to name people and places on many of these photographs, most of them taken around 1887 when this vicinity looked a great deal different than at the present time.

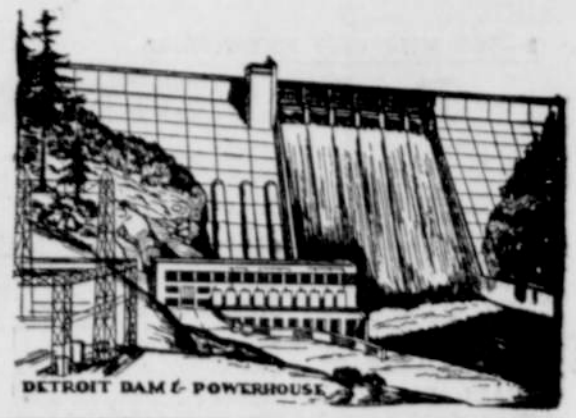

Television Broadcasts Being Received In Mill City At Present Time, Says Stiffler

The station at Salem, according to Mr. Stiffler, should be in operation sometime in September.

No Highway Deaths Over Holiday Period

To date no accidents have been reported to this office over the holiday weekend. Traffic accidents were the major cause of deaths, with 249. No highway fatalities were recorded for Oregon. Drownings accounted for most of the others throughout the nation with 118, and there were 45 miscellaneous fatalities. This is in contrast with 366 traffic deaths, 202 drownings, and 75 miscellaneous deaths a year ago.

Forest Service To Maintain 400 Miles Of Trails In Detroit Area This Summer

DETROIT—In the Detroit District of the U. S. Forest Service, approximately 400 miles of trails is scheduled for maintenance this summer.

Protection and administration of national forest lands are a primary reason for the scheduled work, although the Sky Line trail and Lake trails serve an important recreational purpose.

At the present time three trail clearing crews are at work. Later two crews will be maintained to continue with the work throughout the season.

Upkeep of the trails has been delayed this year because of deep snow in the higher altitudes.

"Manning" of all Lookout stations is behind schedule for the same reason.
