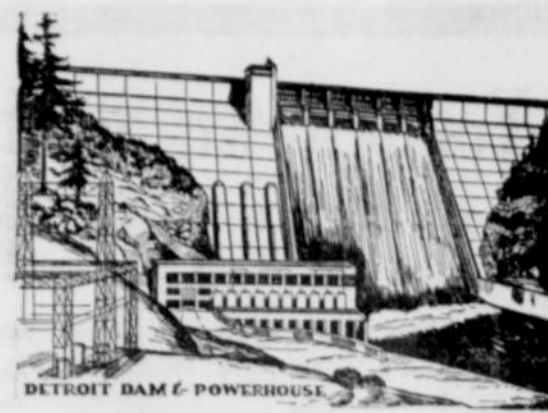

Applications for Antelope Tags To Be Available To Sportsmen By August 1

Pending final adoption of the hunting regulations on or about July 24, applications for antelope tags are being prepared and should be available at game commission license agencies throughout the state by August 1.

A total of 400 permits will be issued to hunt the fleet-footed pronghorns. Application for the permits must be made on an official blank completely filled out or the application will be rejected. In addition, five dollars must be included with the completed blank for each person desiring a permit. As in the past, parties of not more than four persons may apply as a unit provided that each member of the party signs that application. A nonresident is not eligible for a tag.

There will be no hunt in area one this year. Applications for permits in areas two or three must be in the Portland office of the game commission at 1634 S. W. Alder by 10:00 a. m., August 11. Drawings will be held August 13 and tags will be mailed on

Portland Firm Low Bidder On Work At Big Cliff Dam

Western Electrical Construction Company of Portland, Tuesday was low of nine bidders with an offer of \$164,682 when bids were opened by the Portland District, Corps of Engineers, for hauling and installing certain government-furnished machinery and equipment; furnishing and installing other material and equipment; and completion of architectural work, all for the Big Cliff regulating dam powerhouse, part of the Detroit project on the North Santiam river.

The low bid was more than \$10,000 under the government estimate of \$174,962. Bids ranged as high as \$237,972. All work must be completed by June 1, 1954.

Estimated quantities included some 69 different items ranging from the installation of a 480 volt control center to furnishing and installing a quarry tile floor and bases.

Gracie Company, Portland, \$206,952; Newberry Electric Corporation, Los Angeles, \$237,983; Ebblesy Corporation, Mountain View, California, \$174,512; Condit Company, Berkeley, California, \$237,972; West Coast Electric Company, Seattle, \$182,841; H. J. Harris Plumbing and Heating Company, St. Paul, Minnesota, \$224,209.
