**Richard Anderson Reports on Boys' State Meet at Salem**

The week of June 14 to 20th marked the 17th annual session of Beaver Boys' State, sponsored by the American Legion. Boys State is a plan for training in the functional aspects of citizenship. Its purpose is to teach youth of today constructive attitudes toward the American form of government. Boys State was held this year at Willamette University in Salem. I was fortunate enough to be chosen from this community to be one of 265 boys to carry on the work.

Every day there were classes in geology and government. In geology, or world political geography, we learned to judge the power of countries by their location, size, population, etc. In short, geo-politics is the study of the relationship of the earth and states or political bodies. In government we studied the three branches of our government, political parties and the relationship of democracy, communism and fascism.

Someone from the American Bar Association spoke to us each day. The speakers were: Bruce Williams, attorney at law in Salem, trying a civil law suit; Robert Thornton, Attorney general, functions of his office; Dr. Chas. Howard, University of Oregon professor at law, what is law; and Justice Hall Lusk, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, judicial function.

Each day was crowded with nominations, primaries, elections, city meetings, county meetings, etc. We were divided into two parties, the nationalists and the federalists. We also were divided into two counties, each of which had three cities. With all the meetings and elections we had time for recreation and the cities formed basketball, softball and football teams and challenged each other. A group of musicians formed a jazz band and there was a daily paper.

Every evening we gathered in Walker Hall for convocation. Speakers were: G. Herbert Smith, President of Willamette University, "bringing dreams into practical application"; Co. William Brown, Chief of Portland Detective Squad, "evils of communism"; I. R. Barnes, Deputy Warden of Oregon State Prison, "prison life"; Earl T. Newberry, Sec. of State, the functions of his office; and Chas. A. Sprague, ex-governor of Oregon and alternate delegate to the United Nations, "the United States".

Don Gilber of Lebanon was elected governor of Boys State on Friday, June 19. He will go to Washington to participate in Boys Nation. His inauguration was held in the Capitol building that night and afterward a big party was held in the Willamette gymnasium.
