## Misjudging of Speed Cause Many Train-Motor Wrecks

Train-motor vehicle and train-pedestrian accidents have resulted in at least seven deaths since May, records of Oregon's traffic safety division indicate.

One death involved a pedestrian, and six lives were snuffed out in three train-motor vehicle collisions. The figure brought the toll in such accidents so far this year to 10. Last year, 15 deaths were reported in grade-crossing mishaps.

Most accidents involving trains are caused by drivers or pedestrians who misjudge speeds at which trains travel. This is particularly true of accidents in rural areas with trains powered by diesel engines. Drivers, the division said, make the often-fatal mistake of trying to beat a train moving at 80 miles an hour.

The safety division warns that trying to beat trains is little short of suicidal and urges drivers to be especially alert when approaching rural crossings.

"The best approach," they contend, "is to assume a train will be coming and be prepared to stop."

Some accidents at crossings occur because drivers regularly cross and rarely see a train. As a result they unknowingly assume a train will never be on the tracks and stop being cautious. This mistake has proven fatal many times.
