VEHICLE REGISTRATIONS FOR MARION AND LINN COUNTIES SHOW INCREASE FOR 1953

Oregon motor vehicle registrations reached 412,600 during the first six months of the year, a gain of five percent over the number licensed during the same period a year ago, Secretary of State Earl T. Newbry reported today.

All counties shared in the increase, Newbry said. Largest registrations were recorded for Multnomah, Lane and Marion counties, in that order. Marion county's vehicle count was 25,891 as compared with 24,611 during the same period in 1952, while Linn county's figures were 15,140 vehicles in 1953 as compared to 14,392 in 1952.

Traffic deaths in the half-year declined, however, Newbry said. The death count through July totaled 215, a drop of 16 from the 232 fatalities listed last year at the same time.
