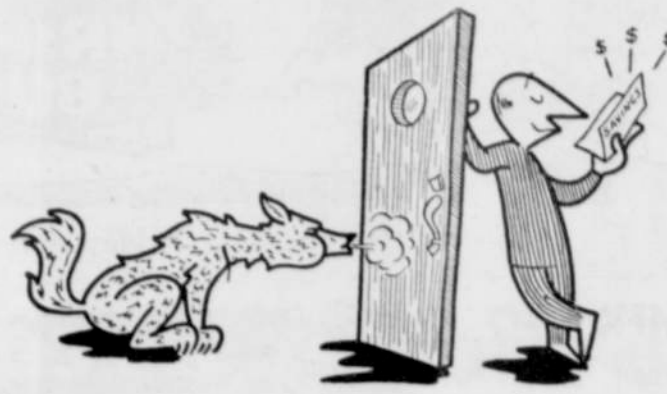

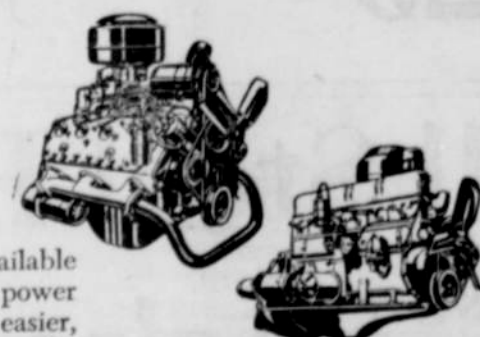



The Golden Text, "God be merciful unto us; and cause his face to shine upon us; that thy way may be known upon earth, thy saving health among all nations" (Psalms 67), which appeared in the Lesson-Sermon read in all Christian Science churches on October 11, gave the keynote to the subject, "Are Sin, Disease, and Death Real."
