Traffic Smash-ups Increase 40 Percent In November  
Traffic smashups killed 37 people in Oregon during September for a 40 per cent increase over the preceding month, Secretary of State Earl T. Newbry reported Friday.

If the upswing continues, Newbry said there is danger that the overall reduction noted thus far for the year may be wiped out. Careless driving to date has claimed 271 lives as compared with 319 reported for the corresponding period last year.

In an attempt to ward off any further increases, Oregon traffic safety officials plan to place special emphasis on reducing pedestrian deaths during the remainder of the year. If successful, this could make a marked difference in the final traffic toll.

Last October, November and December saw 33 pedestrians die in traffic. Safety officers say that if the state could have escaped these deaths, Oregon would have achieved a record death record instead of recording the second highest count in Oregon traffic history.

Early darkness, rains, fog, and increased pedestrian volume during holiday season are important factors in consistently high pedestrian death records for fall and winter months.

Both officials maintain that the real blame for the high pedestrian toll lies with the drivers and walkers who fail to exercise proper individual attention, courtesy and caution.
