open to questions. The fact was presented that the two districts could raise only \$201,-618.93 by bonds as a union high school district. This sum is insufficient to purchase a new site and build an adequate plant.

Don Miley, superintendent of Gates schools, and Howard Means, principal of Mill City high school, reviewed the educational set-up in each of their schools and pointed out the ways in which each are lacking because of the size of the schools. Present enrollment in Gates is 26, with a faculty of four, and 111 in Mill City with six full time and one half-time teachers.

The only time in the past when the combining of the school districts has been brought to the vote of the people was in June of 1952.
