HAPPY NEW YEAR

As a new year begins, it is the part of wisdom for a nation, like a business, to review its assets and its liabilities.

The United States has an unrivaled standard of living. Our men and women enjoy wages and working conditions superior to those existing anywhere else. The tide of goods and services that flows endlessly along the American production and distribution line staggers the imagination. Materially speaking, business, agriculture and labor are doing well.

We have a political system which comes as close to being responsive to the wishes of the people as any one can conceive of. In the last presidential election the people removed from power a party which had been in control for 20 years and put another in its place. In some future election the party now in power will be replaced. But no heads roll; no purges are held; the losers are not liquidated. All are free to air their views.

We are no longer actually at war, unsatisfactory as the Korean situation is. If recent reports are correct, our military strength and that of Western Europe have shown remarkable improvement. The chance of another world war is less than it was.

So much for the good on the national level. Now what about things right here in the North Santiam Canyon? Have we as a group grown along with the rest of the world? Have we made all the normal progress we should have in the past 12 months.

Since purchasing The Enterprise six months ago, we have heard many stories about how Mill City and the rest of the Canyon will hit a slump. This, however, is not the opinion of the public in general. Most residents of the Canyon feel that we are now standing on the threshold of a great development period. It may not come as a boom—so much the better if it doesn't. Let us each work toward a stable progress. Not only in an industrial way, but in agriculture. Many acres of land will be reclaimed from stumps, to grow grass seed or berries, or beans. Maybe someday the many board feet of logs rolling down the highway can be processed right here in the Canyon, giving employment to many more men.

Housing, right at the present time seems to be one of importance here in Mill City. With the steady growth of the area, nearly every nook and cranny is being filled with people. More men are going to be searching for suitable living quarters when M & M gets into full production.

It is our honest belief that this country is just in the primary stages of development. Much can be done to induce tourists to make this canyon one of their playgrounds when visiting the great Northwest. We have everything here with which to work, the problem of development lies within the people themselves. The sooner we get to work on the task before us, the sooner our efforts will bear fruit.

The past year has been a good one—the future looks bright, and we enter the New Year with enthusiasm. By working together no problem is too great to solve.
