Many Convictions on Traffic Counts in 1953
 Nearly 75,000 Oregon drivers were convicted of violating traffic laws during 1953, abstracts of court records received by the Secretary of State indicate.
 Leading violations, which carries a mandatory suspension of driver's license upon conviction, was driving while intoxicated which brought brought fines, jail sentences and suspensions to 3,346 drivers.
 State department officials said that the number of convictions for the year was up 20,000 over the preceding year, but said most of this increase was due to improved court reporting methods rather than to a general increase in driving violations.
 Other than driving while intoxicated, leading reason for license suspensions were reckless driving which resulted in loss of licenses for 512 motorists, failure to report an accident, 573; and violations of the basic rule, 248.
 Fifty-three drivers had licenses suspended on the basis of bad driving records after letters and interviews failed to bring about an improvement.
