Civil Service Commission Announces Coming Exams

The United States Civil Service Commission announced the following examinations: Nurse Anesthetist, \$4,600 and \$5,810 a year for work at various locations throughout the country and in the Panama Canal Zone; Social Worker (Parole), \$4,205, and Instructor (trade shops, vocational agriculture, industrial arts or general shop, related to trades, and general education), \$3,795, for duty in Federal penal and corrective institutions throughout the United States.

No written tests are required. Applicants must have appropriate education, experience or a combination of education and experience. The maximum age limit for the nurse anesthetist position on the Isthmus of Panama is 35 years, in the States, 62 years. There is no maximum age limits for the other positions.

Further examinations regarding the examinations, including instructions on how to apply, and application forms may be secured at any post office throughout the country, or from the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C. Applications will be accepted until further notice for all of the examinations.

Grain Loans End Feb. 1 Says George L. Koo

February 1 instead of January 31 will be the last day grain producers can file applications for price support loans or purchase agreements on their 1953 grain.

Since January 31 falls on Sunday the deadline has been advanced one day.

Loans and purchase agreements are available to grain growers at the price support rates whether the grain is stored on the farm or in an approved warehouse as long as title to the grain has not passed from the producer.

Applications must be made by personal call at the office of the county ASC Committee next to the Extension Service office, third floor of the Courthouse in Albany.

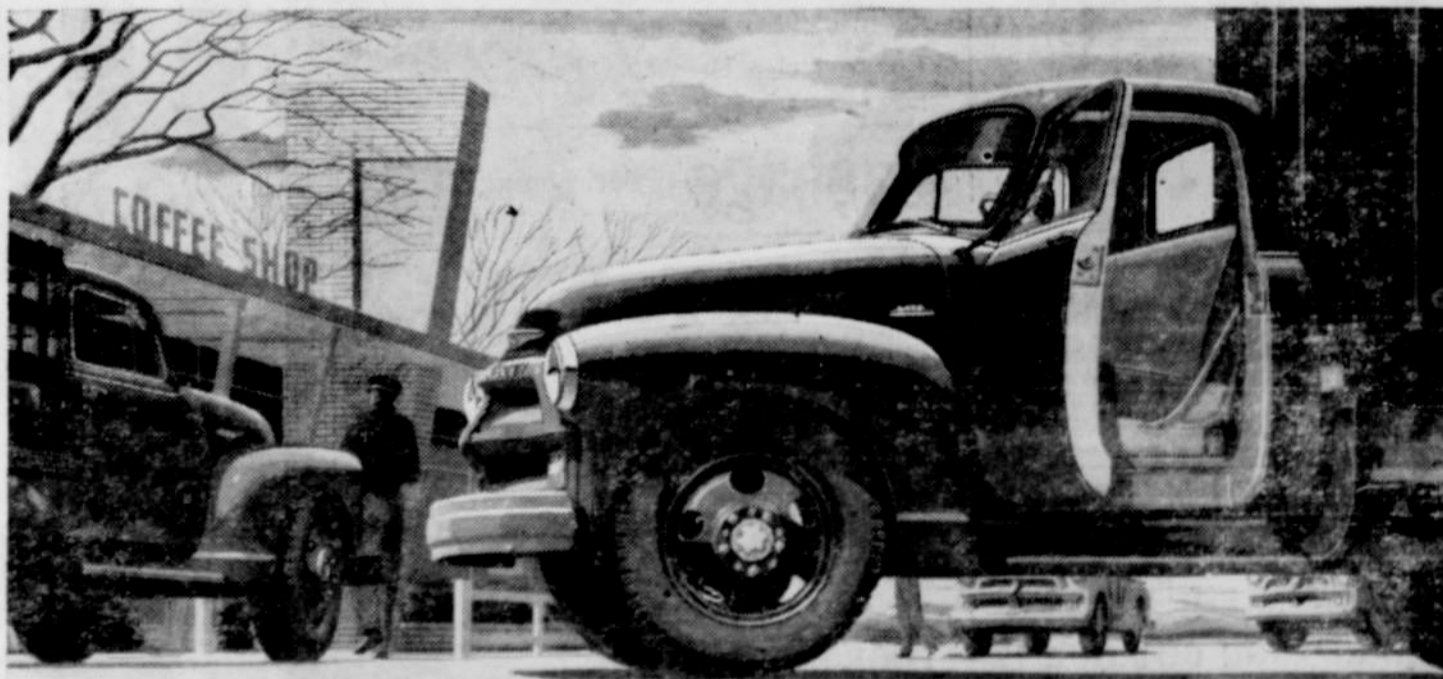
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
