Heart Fund Campaign Slated for February

One of the major functions of the Oregon Heart Association, which is a direct affiliate of the American Heart Association will sponsor a heart fund campaign during the month of February, is that of transmitting new research findings helpful to the recognition and treatment of heart diseases, to physicians and allied workers throughout the state.

To achieve this purpose Dr. Herbert E. Griswold, chairman of the association's scientific activities and professional committee, reports that skilled and trained physicians, who serve without compensation are available to speak before county medical societies and other professionally interested groups and at regional medical meetings throughout the state.

New Look Coming For Washington Road Signs

New stop signs on all state highways, country roads and city streets in the state of Washington will have a red background with the word "STOP" in white. This announcement was made by William A. Buggee of Olympia, Washington, director of highways for the Washington state highway commission, in an announcement to Ray Conway, general manager of the Oregon State Motor association.

The word "STOP" will be fully reflected so that the new sign will stand out when headlights strike it at night. The new sign has been under study for several years. Buggee estimates that it will take six to

seven months to get the new sign into the state. The committee is hopeful of state-wide coverage, so that all physicians and others professionally concerned may be accurately advised of newly adopted aids, techniques and drugs useful in the diagnosis and treatment of cardiac ailments.

The voluntary speakers service augments this annual scientific symposia, sponsored by the association, and open to physicians throughout the state.

replace all the present yellow and black signs on the state system. First replacements will be done as the yellow signs wear out or are broken.

The American Association of State Highway Officials at its meeting last November in Pittsburgh, recommended that each state adopt the red sign as standard. The red sign is said to be more effective in calling attention to stop, as red at a traffic intersection light means stop, whereas yellow means caution.

Tests are now under way in Washington of a new sign which says "Yield Right of Way." If a favorable report received from the tests, these signs may be used at intersections where traffic is not heavy enough to warrant a stop sign. They will indicate to the driver that he doesn't have the right of way and will be considered to be in the wrong if he collides with another vehicle coming from across the street at that point.
