Final Angling Rules 1954

Final angling regulations for 1954 were set by the Oregon State Game commission following a second public hearing held at their Portland headquarters.

Few changes were made in the tentative rules adopted two weeks previously. The general trout season will extend May 1 through October 10 in all zones, and the Cascade mountain lakes, with few exceptions, will open on May 29 and close October 10.

Waters in zone 1 will remain closed from March 1 through April 30 to afford protection to immature trout and salmon and prevent the take of spent and over-ripe steelhead and cutthroat trout. Steelhead spawning activities is greatest in the months of March and April, and the movement of immature salmon to the ocean is heavy.

The Columbia river in all zones is included in the waters open to winter angling in which it is legal to keep 2 fish 12 inches or over in length per day or 4 per week. The special jack salmon bag limit of 10 per day and 20 in possession or in 7 days effective from October 11 to November 16 will apply to the Columbia in all zones. The above two regulations formerly applied only to open waters in zones 1 and 2.

The 1954 angling regulations, including those covering both winter and summer fishing, will take effect on February 6, 1954.

Printed synopsis of the regulations will be available at game commission license agencies and at the game commission headquarters in Portland in the early part of March.

Listed below by zone are the other changes in angling regulations for 1954.

ZONE 1

1. North fork Alsea and tributaries were opened to angling above Bailey creek near the game commission hatchery.

2. Big creek (Lincoln County) was closed to angling above Newport city dam.

3. Cook creek and tributaries (Nehalem) were opened above the south fork.

4. Little Nestucca river was closed to salmon fishing above the head of tidewater from March 1 to October 10. Above the south fork and all tributaries will be closed to salmon angling at all times.

5. South fork of Salmonberry river and tributaries were opened to angling as were the tributaries of Valsetz lake.

6. Youngs river was closed to winter angling.

7. Winter deadline was changed on the Lewis and Clark river to the bridge on Crown Zellerbach's 400 line road.

8. The winter deadline of Lake creek (Siuslaw) was changed to Nelson creek road bridge after November 30.

9. South fork Trask river and tributaries were opened to angling below Edwards creek during both winter and summer seasons.

10. The winter closures on the arms of Tenmile lakes were eliminated.

ZONE 2

1. Tributaries of Detroit and Meridian reservoirs and Harriet lake will open to angling on May 1 along those three bodies of water.

2. The lower deadline for the fall closure on Eagle creek (in Columbia gorge) was changed to the railroad bridge.

3. Fish lake in Linn county was opened from May 1 to May 31.

4. Rat and Teeter creeks, tributaries of Dorena reservoir, were opened to angling.

5. The season on the south fork of Silver creek and tributaries above the Silver creek falls was changed to conform to the general trout season, May 1 to October 10.

6. The North Santiam river was closed to angling for a distance of 0.9 miles below the permanent hatchery racks near Niagara.

7. The Sauvie island game management area shooting grounds were closed to angling on designated hunting days during the 1954 waterfowl season.

8. Middle fork Willamette river was closed to angling from the fish commission rack site below Dexter dam down to the confluence of Fall creek.

9. North Santiam closed to angling for a distance of 400 feet below dams on the main north and south channels of Stayton island.

10. The winter deadline on the south Santiam river was changed to the Cascadia ranger station.

11. The deadline below the falls at Oregon City was lowered on the east side of the river to anchor on a point 54 feet below the southwesterly corner of the electric plant on Black Point from which point the line will extend to the northeasterly corner of Mill A grinder room on the west side of the river, then straight downstream to a point 20 feet below the grinder room arches, then west to the bank of the river. The remainder of the closed area at the falls remains the same as last year.

12. The middle fork of the Santiam river was open to winter angling up to the confluence of Quartzville creek.

13. The winter deadline on the Sandy river was moved up to the logging bridge at Brightwood.

15. The winter deadline on the north fork of Scappoose creek was changed to a point 200 feet below Bonny falls.

ZONE 3

1. The one thousand foot radial closure at the outlet of Diamond lake was lifted.

2. The north Umpqua river was closed to angling from the Soda Spring dam down to the bridge, a distance of approximately 300 yards.

3. Diamond lake season will be May 1 to September 7 and the bag limit is 30 fish per day and 60 in possession or in 7 days.

ZONE 4

1. Fish lake (Jackson county) will open on May 1, with the general trout season.

2. The salmon bag limit on the Rogue river system was changed to permit a daily take of 6 salmon over 15 inches, not more than two of which can be more than 20 inches, and to a weekly possession limit of 13 salmon over 15 inches, not more than 5 five of which can be more than 20 inches.

3. The Rogue river closure below Gold Bay dam was changed to open the lower 400 feet of the present closure from September 1 to December 31.

ZONE 5

1. Charlton creek, tributary to the Crane Prairie reservoir, was opened to angling.

2. Bag limit on Pauline lake reduced to 5 fish per day and 10 in possession on in 7 days.

3. The newly created Walton lake (Ochoco national forest) will open on June 20 with a bag limit of 5 fish per day and 10 in possession or in 7 days and will be closed to angling from motor propelled raft.

4. Davis and Sparks lakes are closed to angling from craft being propelled by a motor.

5. The Metolius river was opened to the confluence of Lake creek, with the exception of an area 100 feet below the bridge at Camp Sherman.

6. Rock Creek reservoir will be open from May 1 to August 15.

ZONE 6

1. Blue lake in Lake county was opened.

ZONE 7

1. Camas, Desolation and Rock creeks (Wheeler county) all tributaries to the John Day river, were closed to steelhead and salmon angling.

2. The deadline for salmon and steelhead angling on the north fork of the John Day river was changed to Highway 395, and the Rock creek in Gilliam county was changed to Highway 19 at Olex.

3. Magone lake tributaries were opened to angling.

4. Umatilla river was closed to angling for a distance of 300 feet below the Cold Springs intake dam.

ZONE 8

No changes.

ZONE 9

1. Grand Ronde river below Beaver creek in Imnaha river below Grouse creek were opened to Dolly Varden angling the entire year.

2. Hobo and Wood lakes in the Wallowa mountains were closed.

3. The deadline for steelhead and salmon angling on the Grand Ronde river was changed to a bridge at Beaver creek.

4. The special season for Dolly Varden on the Wallowa river and its west fork was eliminated.

5. Camp creek and tributaries above Higgins reservoir (Baker county) were opened to angling.

6. The Elkhorn lakes in Grant county were opened to eastern brook trout angling the entire year with no minimum length limit and a daily bag limit of 30 and a possession limit of 60.

Report on Manufacturer's Life Insurance Co. Given

The Manufacturers Life reports that payments to policy holders since incorporation passed the half-billion dollar mark in 1953. The assets of the company held for payments of future policy benefits also passed the half-billion dollar mark during the year.

A record total of \$30 million was distributed in 1953 to beneficiaries and policyholders in death claims, matured endowment, annuity payments and other policy benefits including 4 1/2 millions in dividends to policyholders.

The assets of the company grew by \$48 1/2 million to a total of \$540 million. Government and government guaranteed bonds constituted 17 per cent of assets and corporation and municipal bonds 43 per cent; mortgages constituted 19 per cent of assets, preferred and common stocks 10 per cent and other assets 11 per cent.

The rate of interest earned on the assets increased to 4.66 per cent as compared with the previous year's rate of 4.46 per cent.

The new business in 1953 was \$31 million greater than that written in the previous year and amounted to \$145 million. Business in force now totals \$1,744 million.

The Contingency Reserve and Surplus now amounts to \$33 million.

During 1953, the Manufacturers Life's 50th anniversary in the United States, new business in this country amounted to \$92 million. The business in force in the United States is now 30 per cent of the Company's total figures.

City Ballots Now Must Conform To State Law

Cities which are planning to submit bond issues, special levies, charter amendments or other measures to their voters this spring are reminded by John H. DeMouilly, research attorney of the Bureau of Municipal Research and Services, University of Oregon, that the form of ballot to be used by cities is now prescribed by law. Forms previously used in submitting city measures are no longer

valid, even though prescribed by city charters.

Chapter 632, Oregon Laws 1953, (ORS 254.106) requires that the first measure submitted at any regular or special city election must be numbered 51 and succeeding measures numbered 52, 53, 54 and so on. Squares must be provided for the voter to indicate his "Yes" or "No" vote.
