ceptance of bid \$200.00 shall be deposited for a guarantee in addition to the above sum and shall be held until completion of contract with the sum to be forfeited if successful bidder selected shall fail to pay balance of bid after being notified within two days and/or shall fail to complete job as per this bid including right of way clearance as hereinafter set forth.

All logging shall be in a manner according to the best logging practices obtaining under similar conditions in the State of Oregon.

The boundaries of the clearing lines through Bureau timber are marked with cutting line Bureau tags stapled to trees. These are adequately spaced to indicate exact boundary line. The trees outside this line and the trees with the tags are not to be felled. Trees to be felled which are not indicated by a marked boundary line are marked with the Bureau "Special Cutting" tags. These are leaners and scattered merchantable trees in thin areas.

Logging operations in SE 1/4 of Sec. 21, T. 9 S. R. 2 E. are to be completed by July 1, 1954. Logging operations in other Bureau tracts should be completed by August 1, 1954.

All slash is to be disposed of to meet requirements of state fire control. Such requirements and liabilities as will be required are to be assumed by the logger. The Benton-Lincoln Electric, Cooperative is to have access to rights-of-way at date mentioned above.

If weather conditions do not allow slash disposal prior to this date, and the Cooperative has electric appurtenances installed before conditions allow slash disposal, the logger will make provision to safeguard such appurtenances and assume liability for all destruction resulting from slash disposal.

The logger assume responsibility to remove in aforementioned tracts all loose forest debris and all tree growth from a strip approximately 60 feet in width and this strip to be located in center of the right-of-way. This strip is to extend the full length of rights-of-way through all above mentioned tracts. An unsurfaced road shall be located within this 60 foot strip. Stumps in 60 foot strip need not be removed except those necessary to build road. The road shall be at least 8 feet wide and graded sufficiently to enable wheeled construction vehicles to negotiate road in dry weather. In such areas where topography dictates to secure negotiable grade switch backs or other necessary alignment to the road may be located outside the afore mentioned 60 foot strip. Any natural waterways crossed by this road shall have culverts capable of handling all seasonal drainage, 12 inch culverts being minimum. Logger may terminate road on each side of any larger waterway if he so elects. In doing so, additional access roads must be constructed, as all portions of the aforementioned road must be accessible from the county road.

All snags and all trees over 15 feet in height within the cutting line marked by Bureau shall be felled.

Any party desiring to bid and not wishing to be present may have a sealed bid in prior to oral auction and said bid will be given.
