Oregon Gets Funds For Forest Highways

Highways in the National forests of Oregon have been appropriated \$3,-098,057 for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1954, it was announced by Ray Conway, general manager, Oregon State Motor Association. The funds were authorized by the Federalaid Highway Act approved June 25,

for Oregon will be used in greater part for modernizing obsolete and dangerous conditions of old highways, many of which are links in Federal-aid and State Systems.

Only California was apportione more than Oregon with \$3,218,818 as the first largest amount of Federal aid, with Idaho's share third, totaling \$2,289,655; Alaska fourth with \$1,960,694; Montana fifth with \$1, 791,703; Colorado sixth with \$1,611, 830; Washington seventh with \$1,561, 709; and Arizona eighth with \$1,276, 414.
