In one of the items the management said: "To Our Subscribers—This is the second edition of the Gazette and subscriptions are now due, and we would be pleased to have you call and see us. It takes considerable to start a paper and as our funds are rather short we would be pleased to have you come to the center."

Another item states there will be an excursion train up the road tomorrow.

Henry Joost was advertising boots and shoes; H. D. Bondy, who was a dealer in general merchandise was holding a sale. The Santiam Lumbering company, of which J. A. Shaw was secretary, was advertising lumber and shingles.

boosting for a bridge across the Santiam river.

While on the subject of old time news, we visited with W. R. Hutcherson in Gates Friday. He gave us an oldtime picture of Detroit. He did not know when it was taken, but it is posted in The Enterprise office. "Hutch" is razing one of the old landmarks in Gates at this time. He gave as a copy of a grocery list or "grub stake" found in the old building. The purchase was made from Henkle, McCoy & Co., and it is interesting to note some of the prices on the bill of goods. It was sold to H. A. Hoffman in the 1880's.

Here are some of the items purchased: 20 pounds of butter at 16 1/2c; 49 pounds of crackers, \$3.31; six yeast cakes, 50c; two packages of matches, 20c; 1 dipper, 15c; a box of soap for \$1; four cans of lard for \$5; 65 pounds of brown beans, \$3.25; 100 pounds of cabbage for \$2; six pair of hose for \$1.

Some difference now—but on the other hand, how much nicer it is today to do business in our modern stores—which just goes to show, if you want better things you have to pay for them. Few if any of us would care to return to "the good old days."

Work is progressing on the new approach to our town from the highway. Several residents have inquired of me whether there would be room for a walk along the new route. The answer given by one of the state engineers is that the same old wooden sidewalk would be left intact, and that a curb would be placed on the highway side.
