**Obedience To Traffic Laws  
Would Cut Accidents 90%**

More than 90 per cent of Oregon's 1953 traffic collisions could have been prevented if motorists had done one thing—obeyed traffic laws.

The state highway safety division, Salem, said Friday, that approximately 61,000 of the 86,000 collisions reported to the Secretary of State last year involved a violation of the law on the part of one or more drivers.

This does not mean, however, that drivers were unfamiliar with the law or that they deliberately violate it. Safety men are inclined to believe most violations occur only when drivers become careless or inattentive. This can happen, they warn, when an individual becomes tired, or when he is "giving the car its head" while he thinks about something else.

Some drivers, the division said, gradually form bad habits—making half-stops at stop signs, edging up on the red light, lane jumping—which also eventually leads to collisions.

One of the best ways to prevent accidents, the office said, is to remain alert and obey all rules and regulations to the letter. Such behavior, they said would also save thousands of dollars which otherwise law-abiding citizens have to pay in traffic fines when police officers spot acts of carelessness and inattention.

**Bangs Disease Decline  
Noted In Oregon Herds**

Oregon is in an enviable position nationally because of the low percentage of Bangs or Brucellosis reactors found in dairy herds throughout the state, reports H. P. Ewalt, extension dairy specialist of the Oregon State college.

For the past several years Bangs disease has been on the decline in Oregon, the specialist explains. In 1948, 1.68 percent of cows tested in the state were reactors. Among the cows tested in 1953, only .778 percent reactors showed up. The 1948 Oregon figure was low compared with national figures, the specialist stated.

This improved picture, says Ewalt, is due to a "consistent, well-coordinated program conducted by the state department of agriculture, federal bureau of animal industry, and the Oregon State college extension service—with excellent cooperation from the state's dairymen." The program is divided into three phases—tests and slaughter, sanitation and vaccination.

Despite a decrease in the number of dairy cows in the state, more have been tested for Brucellosis each year. There were 289,843 cows from 29,130 herds tested in 1953, while 246,437 cows were tested in 1948.

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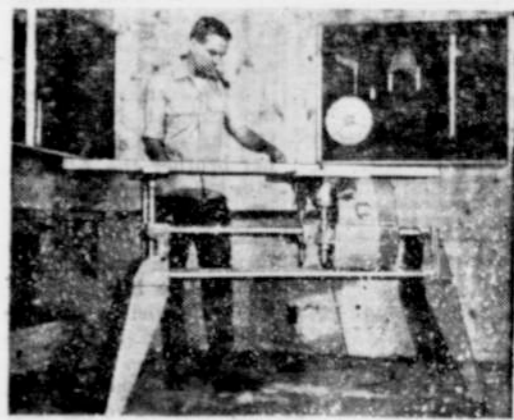
