Closed Season on Use of Fires in Forest Lands in Effect Beginning April 1

Closed season on the use of fire on 29 million acres of private and public forest lands will commence April 1, the state board of forestry announced recently.

Beginning April 1, the state board of forestry reported, it will be unlawful to burn debris, grass or stubble within one-eighth of a mile of forest land without first securing a written permit from the local forest ranger or warden. Dates for the closed season extend from April 1 through December 31. If fire weather conditions warrant, the governor may advance the opening date to February 1 or terminate the closed season prior to December 31st.

The opening date of April 1 au-

thorized by the new law replaces the old act which established May 15 as the opening day of the closed season unless moved up by proclamation by the governor.

Loggers and sawmill operators were cautioned to have all fire fighting equipment in readiness as required by the forest laws not later than April 1. Official inspections will be made by field personnel beginning on that date, forestry officials advised.

The state board urged continued public vigilance in the woods during 1954 when using fire or power-driven equipment. Fire prevention is a big part of the forest protection program, they said, and reported that continued reduction of man-caused fires would not only serve to keep Oregon green but would save hundreds of thousands of dollars of fire fighting costs and valuable, growing timber.
