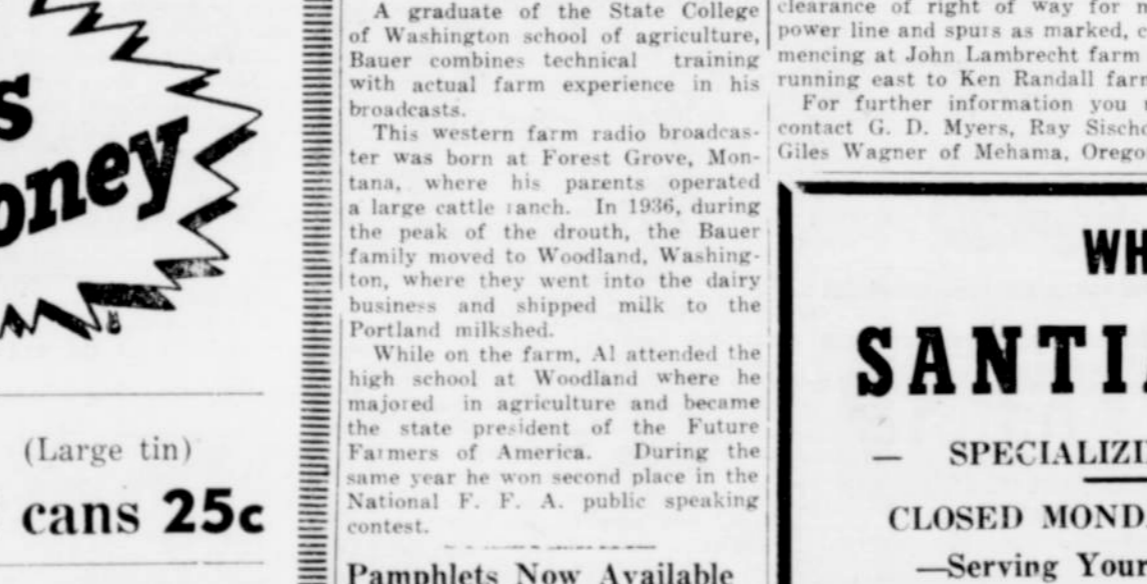

## Salem Radio Station To Begin Farm Department

A veteran radio broadcaster is leaving the Portland area to get up a farm Service Department at KSLM in Salem. Alvin D. "Al" Bauer, leaves station KPOJ in Portland after years of service. He will start his Salem shows on April 1st. Bauer is well known for his on-the-spot coverage of farm events. His "Pay-Dirt" program has won many radio awards



including the National Farm Safety award in 1949, 1951 and 1953.

A graduate of the State College of Washington school of agriculture, Bauer combines technical training with actual farm experience in his broadcasts.

This western farm radio broadcaster was born at Forest Grove, Montana, where his parents operated a large cattle ranch. In 1936, during the peak of the drouth, the Bauer family moved to Woodland, Washington, where they went into the dairy business and shipped milk to the Portland milkshed.

While on the farm, Al attended the high school at Woodland where he majored in agriculture and became the state president of the Future Farmers of America. During the same year he won second place in the National F. F. A. public speaking contest.
