## KEEN COMPETITION FACES STRAWBERRY GROWERS IN STATE

Competition will be keen for Oregon strawberry growers and processors this year, says D. M. Thomas, agricultural economist at Oregon State college. Efficient production and marketing are cited as the key to staying business.

Acreage on the West Coast is expected to be a shade smaller than during 1953 but production could be larger, Thomas reported in the latest issue of the "Agricultural Situation and Outlook" circular published by OSC. A reduction of 1400 acres is indicated for Oregon in 1954. This will be partially offset by an increase of 1000 acres in California. No change is anticipated for Washington.

"Trends in acreage suggest that recent prices have been more attractive to California growers than they have been in Oregon and other important strawberry states," Thomas explains.

California's acreage increase could result in a West Coast crop 10 percent greater, he adds, if yields hold to 1953 levels. California's yields are much higher than Oregon's, the economist points out.

Competition from other fruits and leveling-off in consumer incomes are apt to have adverse effects on the purchasers of packaged strawberries, the economist reports.

Supplies of frozen fruits in the nation's cold storage warehouses on February 1 were about a fourth larger than a year earlier. However, out-of-storage movement during January was two-thirds greater than during the same month a year earlier. Should this continue during the next three months, carry-over at the start of the 1954 season will be smaller than last spring.

Roland Groder, OSC agricultural economist, reports that during 1953, the Pacific Coast states produced more than half of the Nation's strawberries. Oregon supplied about 15 percent of the national supply and California, 32 percent.

Oregon growers sold 96 percent of their production to processors and California sold 60 percent.

## Annual Fish Liberation Activities Under Way

Oregon State Fish Commission crews have started the annual fish liberation activities. At present, six trucks are in operation and shortly three more will be added to the rolling stock.

Thus far, approximately 300,000 fish have been liberated. Plantings have included silver salmon, steelhead, and chinook salmon which have been planted in the coastal streams and all of which have been marked for future identification.

The crews are now releasing trout in coastal lakes, and beginning next week, trout will be released in the streams of the area. Also, next week trucks form the Leaburg hatchery on the McKenzie river will start hauling to Willamette valley reservoirs, and the Oak Springs hatchery near Maupin will start sending fish to various parts of eastern Oregon. In addition to these liberations of legal size trout, kokanee fry will be stocked in several of the lakes, and some stocking of fingerling-sized rainbow and cutthroat trout will be carried out in coastal waters.

Rieno Kosi, liberation biologist for the game commission, listed the following tentative schedules of releases of catchable-size fish to be carried out during the coming year:

March	50,000 trout
April	600,000 trout
May	600,000 trout
June	550,000 trout
July-August	500,000 trout

Through the marking of many of these fish, the commission is attempting to gather as to their whereabouts after release. Any sportsman catching marked fish can aid the commission in sending in a report containing full details regarding the catch.

## Linn County Cleanup From May 3 to 8 says Arnold

The week of May 3-8 has been designated as clean-up week in Linn county, says Karl Arnold, Rt. 1, Albany, chairman of Linn county clean-up week committee.

Last year's program in concentrating toward a county-wide clean-up program was so successful that the committee has decided to make it an annual event. The slogan of the committee is "Make Linn County Clean."

The committee is asking all city governments, chamber of commerces, civic clubs, Granges, Farmers Unions, Farm Bureau Centers, garden clubs, 4-H clubs, Future Farmers Chapters, Boy Scouts, community clubs and similar groups to declare May 3 to 8 as clean-up week, and sponsor clean-up activities during that period.

Arnold points out that concentrated effort by a large number of organi-

ations during a single week will be effective in making Linn county's rural and urban areas more attractive. A major object in the campaign is to eliminate unsightly trash along public roads and highways.

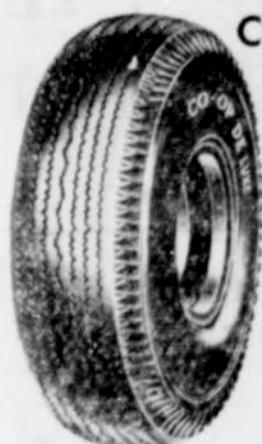
