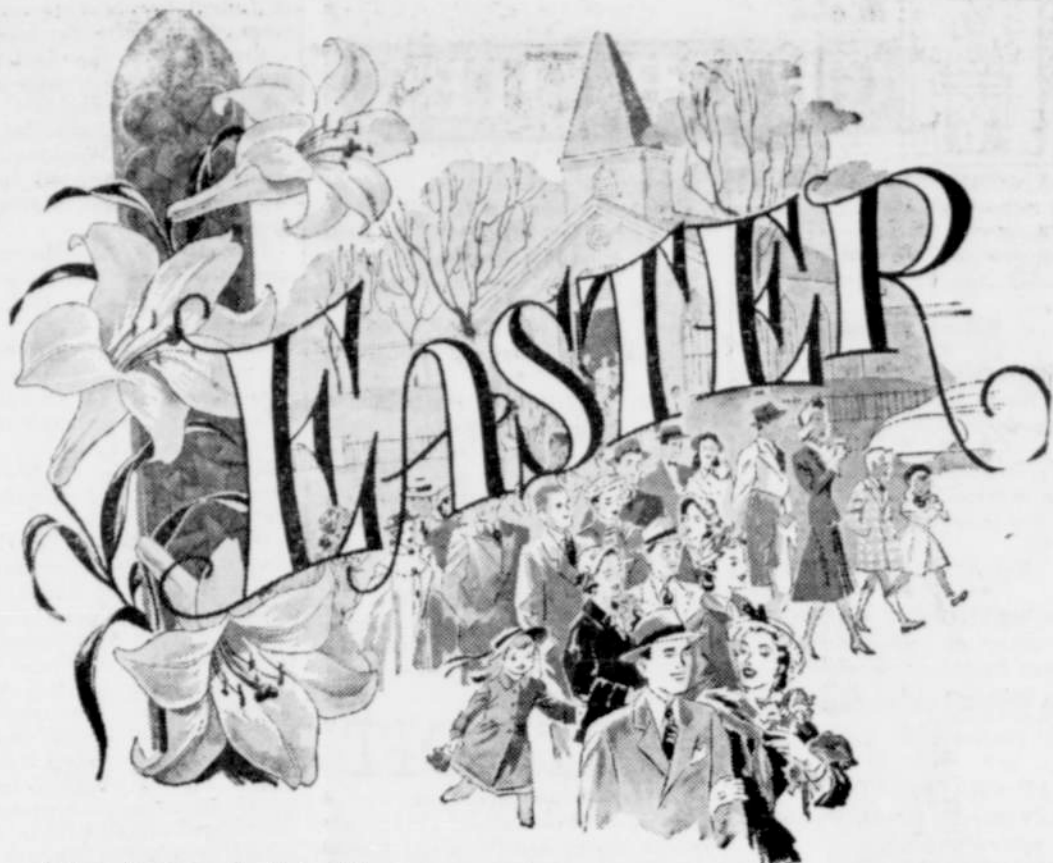

Saviour (Their Devotion.)

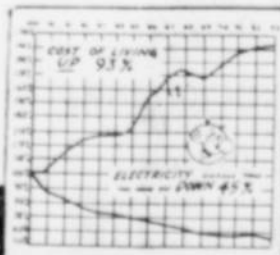
Thus a message of the Scripture is related,
