Apportioments, involving liquor privilege tax moneys and amusement device tax moneys, both for the quarter ending March 31, 1954, were announced recently.

The liquor privilege tax apportionment aggregated \$190,000. funds were distributed on the basis of 75 per cent to the counties and 25 per cent to the general fund of the state. The law provides for shares to pensions, mother's aid and




