

A fatal heart attack to another Gates resident came at almost the same time. George Clise, a close friend of Mr. Hirte, who had given aid at the scene of the accident, drove to Mill City to notify Mrs. Hirte of the ccident. Mrs. Clise ran into the lodge all to tell Mrs. Hirte and her daughter, and found upon her return to the car, that her husband had suffered the fatal attack.
