D. B. Hills Enjoying Sojourn In Europe

In a letter received this week from the D. B. Hills in Paris, France, to relatives here, Mrs. Hill states that the crossing on the Queen Elizabeth was wonderful, although a bit rough. The ship contains a bank, men's clothing shop, women's shop, souvenirs, swimming pool, theatre, and a large main lounge where tea is served. Among the ship's passengers were the Duke and Duchess of Windsor, Leopold Stokowski and Marjorie Main.

Mrs. Hill was a little worried when she heard that they were to be "tenderized" at Cherbourg, until they found that a tender was coming out to meet the ship and take them ashore. A train, very comfortable and with large windows for sight-seeing, took them to Paris. They couldn't help but notice the absence of automobiles and the presence of numerous bicycles. The country-side was beautiful, it being "Apple Blossom Time in Normandy." Stone houses, two and three stories high, and ornate cathedrals were especially noticed, there being many thickly-populated cities and villages enroute. Ruins from the war were still in evidence.

The Hills were warned not to drink milk while in France, because of the in Paris, was described as very old, lack of sanitation. The Grand hotel but beautiful, covering an entire city block. The Arc de Triomphe, the Eiffel Tower, and the site of La Bastille had already been viewed, as had Napoleon's tomb.

There was also mention that finding mail waiting for them in Paris was an added thrill, as nothing takes the place of news from home. The travelers should be in Italy until around May 15, having gone on from France on May 4.
