Mill City Defeats Lebanon Softballers in First Game

The Mill City softball team defeated Western Veneer of Lebanon in the first softball game of the season at Allen Field Thursday night. The locals collected 14 hits off Wimpy Carvel of Lebanon, while Don Carey allowed only five hits. Joe Lalack was catcher for Mill City. Mill City won the nine inning game 8 to 5.

Several things are needed in Mill City to make the proposed driver training project for students of high school age. This project is now in the formative stage and is not to be confused with a regular school driver training course. This is being done by the boys themselves with the aid of Police Chief Meador and other interested citizens.

It is said that over 20 boys from the local high school have signed up for the instruction.

Needed for the program are one 40-acre tract of land, to construct the oval track, old cars, metal bucket seats, two-inch pipe, and some help in rebuilding the cars to conform to the standards set up by the club.

Only jalopies can be used and no "souped-up" cars will be allowed.

The cars must be cut down to the bottom of the windows, and all doors welded shut; two-inch pipe must be welded front to back and from side to side in arches to form a "rocking-chair," top; all inflammable upholstery must be removed from the interior and metal bucket seats with safety belts used. Drivers must have crash helmets and goggles.

The drivers must take instruction under a qualified driver at the track in hand signals, stopping, parking, passing, turning and other driving instructions before they will be allowed to be on the track with other cars.

After instructions have been given a sufficient number of times to qualify the boys, short runs and races, called Road-races, will be open to the public.

Several Mill City citizens have already offered to donate old cars and help the boys get them into safe driving shape, but more cars are needed. Those having old cars or any other of the above needed articles are asked to contact Chief Meador.
