Gasoline Sales in Oregon Show Increase in April

Gasoline sales in Oregon during the month of April again showed an increase over sales for the same period in 1953, it has been reported. Total sales reported were 47,074,620 gallons, an increase of 753,013 gallons. Total taxes paid on the gasoline to the state was \$2,824,477.25, a gain of \$45,180.45 over April of last year. The first three months of 1954 showed a decrease in gasoline sales, but March and April increases show a net gain for the period of January 1, to April 30, of this year of 604,047 gallons, and \$36,236.76 in taxes, over the same period in 1953.
