See Oregon Safely Pamphlets Being Given Tourists Visiting State
Out-of-State vacationists will be familiarized with Oregon traffic laws as part of the state's continuing program to reduce summer traffic deaths.

This year, as last year, 20,000 copies of a state department pamphlet, "See Oregon Safely," will be distributed to "foreign" licensed drivers by members of the Oregon Motor Court Association.

The pamphlet contains brief explanations of some of the state's most important traffic regulations and several safety driving suggestions.

Last year, the department said, non-resident drivers were involved in 65 fatal accidents and nearly 6,000 other mishaps, a substantial reduction over the 1952 record of 71 fatal accident involvements and 7,450 non-fatal mishaps.

Traffic of all kinds during the three vacation months, June, July and August, claimed 98 lives as compared with 113 killed during the same period in 1952.

Preliminary Qualifying Exams For U. S. Naval Academy Appointments
Representative Walter Norblad, Republican, Oregon, announced today that he has arranged with the Civil Service Commission to hold on Monday, July 12, 1954, a preliminary qualifying examination to determine the eligible candidates for appointment in 1955 to the U.S. Naval Academy, Annapolis, Maryland; the U. S. Military Academy, West Point, New York; and the Air Force Academy.

Candidates for the Naval Academy must not be less than 17 years of age nor more than 32-years of age on July 1, 1955.

Candidates for the Military Academy and the Air Force Academy are eligible for admission from the day they are 17 until they become 22 years of age, on which latter day they are not eligible.

Candidates for these Academies must be actual residents of the First Oregon District, which embraces Benton, Clackamas, Clatsop, Columbia, Lincoln, Marion, Polk, Tillamook, Washington and Yamhill counties, and must never have been married.

In order to make the necessary arrangements, applicants must notify Congressman Walter Norblad, 1121 House Office Building, Washington 25, D. C., in writing not later than June 14, 1954, of their desire to participate in the examination.
