A well child conference will be held Tuesday, October 26 from 10 until 3:30 in the basement of the Mill City high school.

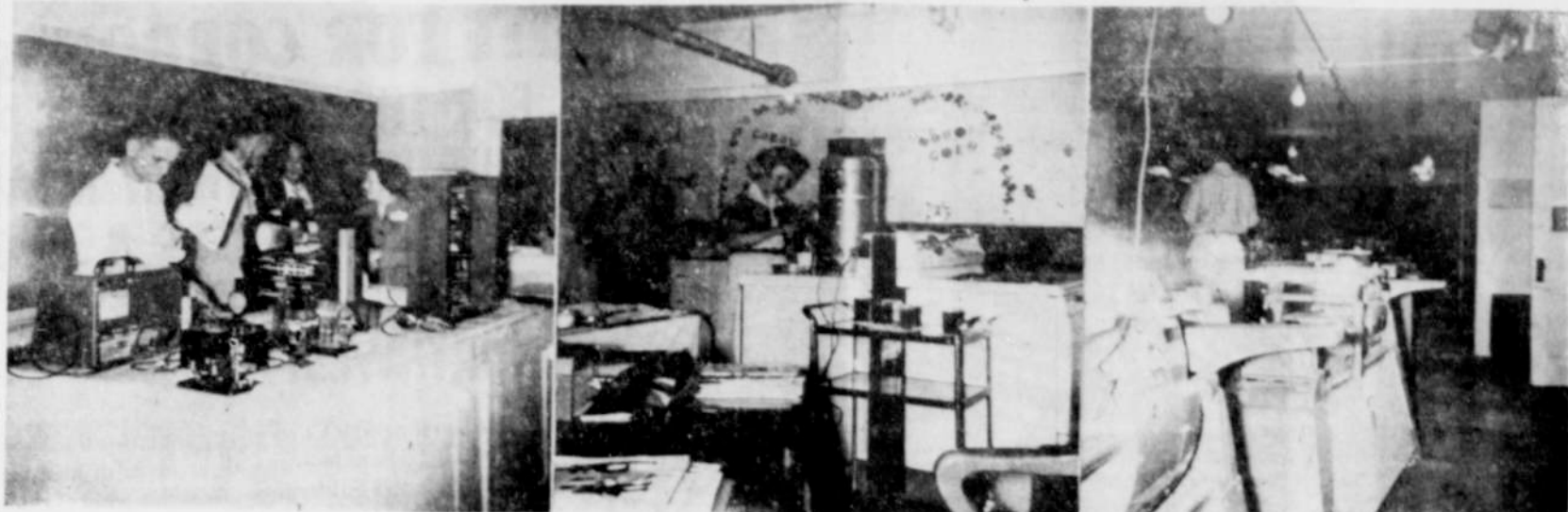

Neuberger Has Large Crowd at Stayton

Richard L. Neuberger, aspirant to the office of U.S. Senator, spoke before a capacity crowd at Stayton grade school Monday night.

His talk was based on the three issues of his campaign: Columbia river and other electrical development, and conservation of resources, off-shore oil land bill, and subsidies to farmers.

Among other things, Neuberger proposed the tax exemption minimum be raised from \$600 to \$800 per person.

Other notables at the meeting were Herb Rolph from Denver, vice president of the National Farmers Union; Thomas Enright, Washington, D. C., secretary to Wayne Morse, and Harley Libby, state president of the Farmers Union, who introduced Neuberger.

In the second quarter Jack Melting uncorked a beautiful pass to Lloyd Ross which set up Don Lemke's scoring plunge from two yards out. Ross hauled in another Melting pass for the conversion and the half ended seven up.

Late in the third quarter a Mill City fumble on their own 10-yard line set up the second Lion score. The conversion attempt was smothered by a charging defensive line. The Wolves took a fumble on the Jefferson 20 and pushed it down to the two where Lemke tallied again. Melting kicked the deciding point with about two minutes left to play.

The entire Timberwolf line played a fine defensive game with Lloyd Ross and Doug Hirt leading the pack. The Melting to Ross pass combination clicked four times when they were needed most. Don Lemke rammed the Jefferson line for more yardage than could be counted and provided the punch for the Mill City offense.
