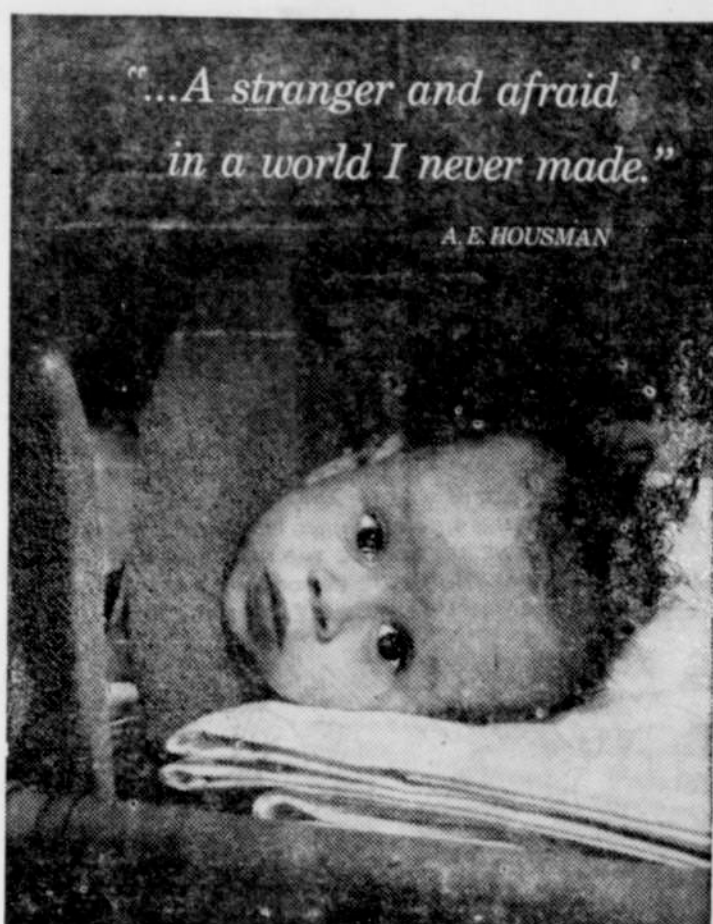

Three-month-old Bobby Hill of Blanchester, Ohio was America's youngest iron lung polio patient in 1954. This emergency March of Dimes respirator saved his life. Now freed from the respirator, Bobby will continue to receive all the March of Dimes help he needs in his journey back to health. The March of Dimes will end on January 31.

THE HOPE:

This past summer 440,000 school children throughout America were inoculated with a trial polio vaccine, which offers great hope for the future. Now the results of this enormous trial operation are being evaluated by Dr. Thomas Francis Jr. and his staff at the University of Michigan. The Francis Report will be issued some time this spring. Until then, no one will know whether the trial vaccine is the beginning of the end for polio.

THE OUTLOOK:

If the vaccine is licensed for use, it will mean that thousands of children, and adults too, will be spared the ordeal of Bobby Hill, youngest iron lung patient stricken in 1954. But for Bobby Hill himself, a proven vaccine can be of no help. His will be a long and difficult fight, just as it will be for thousands of other polio patients. And even with a successful vaccine it will not be possible to prevent many thousands of new cases during the next few years.

To pay for all this . . . vaccine, treatment of patients like Bobby Hill, new scientific research, training of treatment personnel and for special equipment such as iron lungs . . . your generous contribution to the March of is needed.

More Use State Parks

The Oregon State Highway commission announced this week the heaviest annual usage on record in Oregon's state parks during the past year.

Over 5,800,000 persons took advantage of new facilities, redevelopment and newly development state parks during the year, the Highway records for attendance in a single year. Previous record attendance in Oregon's parks was seen in 1952 when over 5,390,000 persons used the areas for various types of recreation.

Though a greater number of out-of-state visitors have used Oregon's parks during the year, the Highway Commission stressed the fact that the increase in attendance in Oregon's parks during the past several years is mostly due to a larger number of local patrons being able to use them. Increased local patronage is possible largely because of the development program in existing parks which was begun during the past five years by the park division, under the jurisdiction of the Oregon State Highway Commission.

The Commission also mentioned the fact that Oregon's park attendance ranked ninth in the United States as shown in the last report of the National park service covering state the same time the report shows that though attendance was large, the Commission and Parks Division was able to keep expenditures within the budget and provide the public with clean, pleasant and modern facilities.

The National Park report further shows that during the period 1948-1953, attendance in the nation's parks increased 48 percent in that same period, Oregon's park attendance under the development program, increased 112 percent.

At Cape Lookout State Park, near Tillamook on the Oregon coast, which was dedicated during 1954 and first opened to overnight use during the year, attendance figures jumped from a mere trickle to over 75,000. Among reasons for the increase in attendance was the development of roads into the park, better signing provided by the Highway Department and opening of modern facilities for both picnicking and campers. Day users totaled 67,218 during the year and overnight campers 8,169. Over 150,000 are expected to use the park in 1955. Other parks with similar facilities show equally increased attendance, particularly since the development program has been under way, according to the Highway Commission.

Convict Drunk Drivers

Corvallis and Pendleton lead Oregon cities in percent of convictions stemming from driving while intoxicated arrests, reports of the National Safety Council's committee on tests for intoxication which has just been released, reveals.

Both cities battled 1,000 in convictions for the period studied. Twenty-two drivers in Corvallis were given chemical tests for intoxication, all of whom were arrested and convicted. Three other arrests for which no chemical tests were given also resulted in convictions.

In Pendleton, 14 drivers who received chemical tests to reveal blood alcohol content in the brain were likewise convicted. Thirty-nine drivers were arrested and convicted for intoxication without chemical tests.

Four other Oregon cities took part in the 1953 study:

Portland reported 214 arrests for driving while intoxicated as a result of chemical tests, and at least 48 percent of those arrested were later convicted, according to preliminary reports. Forty-five percent of those arrested without chemical tests being made were convicted.

Albany tested 15 drivers, 14 of whom were arrested. Twelve were convicted for 86 percent conviction record.

Astoria tested 12 drivers, all of whom were arrested and convicted. Driving while intoxicated arrests made without benefit of chemical tests numbered 31 and 30 were convicted.

Medford arrested 55 drivers after giving blood tests to suspect motorists and all 55 were convicted. In cases where no chemical tests were given, three of five drivers were convicted. The national group noted a 26 percent increase during 1953 in number of cities using some form of chemical testing for intoxication—blood, breath, urine, saliva or combinations of the four.

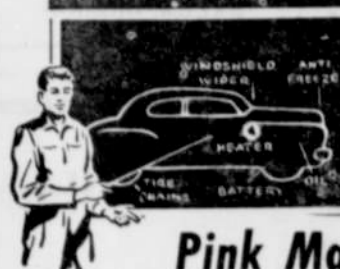
