## Unemployment Pay Over \$20 Million

Unemployment compensation benefits in Oregon totaled \$20,406,000 in the year ended July 1, the third highest on record.


But the number of persons looking for work now has dropped to 22,400, which is the lowest in nearly two years.

The Unemployment Compensation Commission also announced that the number of weekly claimants for benefits has fallen below 8,000 for the first time in three years.

Every local office of the commission except Baker reports fewer unemployed persons than were a year ago when 38,900 were unemployed.

Benefits paid in June totaled \$790,199, the lowest June figure since 1952.
