He had lived here in the early days and was married to Miss Jenny George, daughter of B. T. George, who settled in Niagara many years ago, when that place was a booming little city. Mr. Gaines is survived by one sister and a brother, Richard Gaines, also well known in the canyon.

Wednesday news came of the death, Tuesday night, October 18, of Paul Ratzeburg, who with his family made their home here for many years. At the time of his death, he with his wife were residing in Vail.

Gilbert Weathers, lately of Hubbard, died Tuesday at a Salem hospital, after a short illness. He is survived by his wife, two daughters and 10 sons. One daughter, Mrs. Marvin Stafford, whose home is in Niagara, is for the present, living at Dexter. Mr. Weathers and his family came to Gates about five years ago, where he bought and operated a service station for several years. He was elected and served as Councilman with the first City Council, following the incorporation of the city.

## U. S. National Shows Increase in Deposits

Figures released to the comptroller of the currency as of October 5, indicate that the United States National bank has marked up a better than 12% increase in deposits since the October 1954 report.

U. S. National deposits now total \$762,003,269 which is a gain of more than 86 million dollars during the past 12 months.

The Mill City branch reported deposits in the amount of \$2,084,375.65, according to D. B. Hill, Jr., manager.

U. S. National also showed gains in total resources which rose from \$732,933,021 a year ago to \$827,562,848 at present.

Loans and discounts for the statewide banking system increased more than 46 million dollars. The 12-month gain gives U. S. National a loans and discounts total of \$292,505,416.

Total loans and discounts for the Mill City branch now stand at \$718,068.25.

Since last October the U. S. National has added 16 new branches, bringing to 62 the total number of offices serving the state.

"The increase in both deposits and loans and discounts closely points out the vital role this bank plays in meeting the financial needs of Oregon businesses and individuals," Hill commented.
