## George Cree Hit Monday Night

George Cree, who lives just west on town on the old highway, suffered painful and serious injuries when struck by a pickup truck as he walked across the highway near his place about 6 o'clock Monday evening. He was taken to the Salem Memorial hospital, suffering from a broken leg and a broken arm.

He was immediately put under sedatives and his leg placed in a partial cast. According to Mr. Cree's daughter, Mrs. Floyd Johnson, he had parked his own pickup, which he was using to haul straw to his stockshed by the side of the highway with the lights burning while he closed the gate. The two men from Albany, who were returning home in the other pickup from an elk-hunting trip, stated they were blinded by the lights and the stormy conditions at the time, and could not see Mr. Cree in his dark rain-clothing. They offered all assistance possible, as did Harold Kliever who happened along at that time.

Mr. Cree already had a cold and congestion of the lungs, and it was hoped that no further ill effects would result from his lying on the wet highway until he could be transferred to the hospital.

Mrs. Cree, wife of the injured man, is still in a wheel chair recovering from hospitalization as the result of a broken leg she suffered in a fall about two months ago. She had undergone serious major operation not too long before that. The family has been endeavoring to locate some capable woman to stay with Mrs. Cree.
