## Idanha Man Loses Life in Lake Plunge

of Idanha, lost his life apparently early Sunday morning, when his car skidded off the highway and went into Detroit reservoir at a point just east of the place where the old engineer's office was located. Skid marks showed he was evidently coming down the canyon when the accident occured. He was seen in Detroit between the hours of midnight and 1 a. m. Sunday.

A Salem woman reported the tragedy about 1:30 p. m. Sunday when she saw Adam's body floating near an oil slick close to the shore. Police said Adams was apparently alone when his car made the fatal plunge. There are no guard rails at this point on the highway.

Police stated there was not much hope of recovering the car, as it is in about 200 feet of water.

Adams was born September 30, 1913, at Mayfield, Minn. His body was shipped there Tuesday for burial. He is survived by his mother, two brothers and his sister.
