More Accidents Happen On Highways at Night

traffic accidents take place at night when there are considerably fewer cars on the road than in daylight, analysis of reports reveal.

Of the 359 fatal smash-ups reported last year, 188 were listed as taking place during hours of dark-ness and 79 of the 152 fatals reported in the first half of 1955 happened after dark.

A basic reason for this paradox is fact that darkness hides danger.

Some drivers seem to forget that at night a stalled car, a pedestrian in the roadway or any other object can't possibly be seen until it comes within headlight range. Then the hazard seems to loom up out of Art Anderson were hostesses and nowhere.
