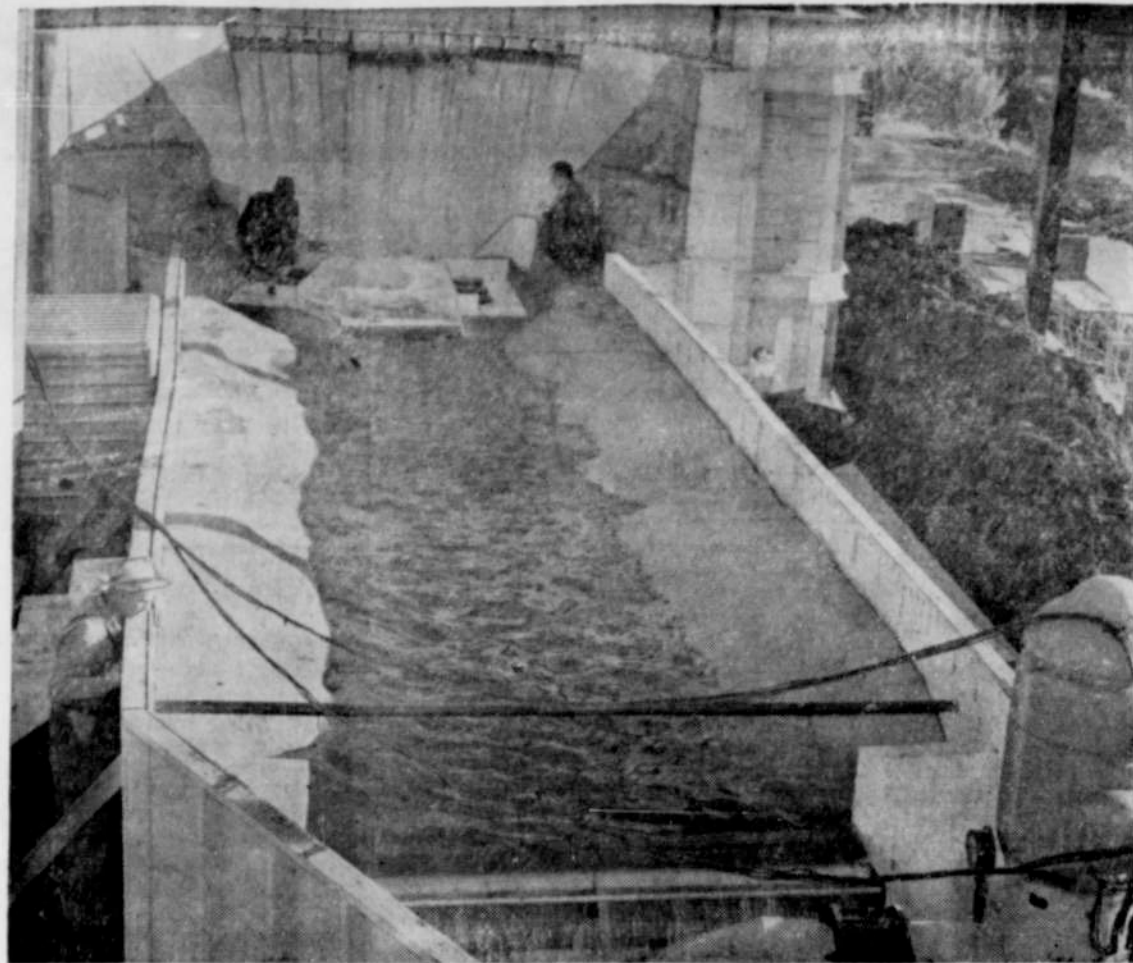

TB Seals Funds Used for Year Round Project Of the Association

The traditional delivery of Christmas seals was made recently when postment carried almost 30,000 letters of county residents from the Marion County Tuberculosis and Health Association.

W. W. McKinney, president of the association, states "Although we have been working for 73 years to conquer the ravaging disease of tuberculosis and have accomplished much, we must continue our relentless fight to stamp out this enemy of mankind. In Marion County this year 38 cases have been reported, which is 13 more than during the year 1954. I hope everyone can and will support the sale of Christmas seals in 1955 so that we can keep working for the control of tuberculosis."

Preparations for the seal sale have been under the direction of Lynn Woods, Marion County seal sale chairman. According to Mr. Woods 40% of the active cases at present do not know they are sick. He said "the funds derived from the seal sale finance an educational program to motivate everybody to make sure that they are not contributing to the spread of the disease. The seal sale also helps to provide much needed money for research that will develop immunization and a cure for tuberculosis."

For the past two months volunteers from this district have actively participated in the work of preparing the Christmas seal letters. Chairmen from this area are: Mrs. A. E. Nesbitt, Mill City; Mrs. Lloyd Ketchum, Detroit, and Mrs. Roselle Myers, Idanha.

Christmas seal sale funds are used for special case finding projects, the year round activities of the association, and the maintenance of the office at 1890 State street in Salem.

This year the Marion County Tuberculosis and Health Association is co-sponsoring a tuberculin testing program with the Marion County Health Department, through which tests for tuberculin will be conducted for all first graders and entering high school students in the county. The entire cost of this project including tuberculin, all follow-up tests and chest x-rays for contacts of positive reactors, and all clerical work, will be paid by the Marion County Tuberculosis and Health Association, with the Health Department furnishing the nursing service.
