Army Engineers Invite Bids for Detroit Dam Access Road

Bids have been invited by the Portland District, Corps of Engineers, for construction of an access road to the south stilling basin at Detroit Dam on the North Santiam River, 49 miles east of Salem.

Colonel Jackson Graham, Portland District Engineer, said the road will provide access to a test conduit built at the time of construction of the Detroit project.

The bids will be opened at 2 p. m. June 27 in Room 628 Pittock Block, Portland. Completion time is 60 calendar days.

Estimated quantities are: 6000 cubic yards of unclassified roadway excavation, 2200 cubic yards of excavation from borrow, 120 lineal feet of 24-inch corrugated metal culvert pipe in place, 24 lineal feet of 18-inch corrugated metal culvert pipe in place and 920 cubic yards of gravel surfacing.
