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New Super Market To Open In Mill City Soon; Tomans to Move Store to Bank Building

Mill City will have a new super-market in the near future when Elmer Peterson of Silverton will take over the space now occupied by Ideal Food Market, plus the space occupied by Hilltop General Store.

A lease was signed this week by Mr. and Mrs. Albert Toman for the space in the U. S. National bank

building formerly occupied by McCarthy Furniture store, and work is underway at the present time getting that building in shape for the hardware store.

When Mr. Peterson gets his store opened here, it will be the largest food market in this part of the county. Mr. Peterson is no newcomer here, having worked as manager here when Ideal Market first opened up.

Definite date for the move has not been established at press time, but it is expected to take place sometime about the middle of next month.

Mr. and Mrs. Toman, who built the Hilltop Store building in 1949, have leased it to Peterson for three years.

Dist. Governor Here for Lions Charter Night

District Governor Claude E. Hall of Waldport was guest speaker Hebe Monday night at the annual charter night dinner, to which the wives of members were invited.

Mr. Hall in his brief talk stated that Lions club had spent over \$55 million in foreign aid, and that the Lions clubs the world over are a great force in preserving the peace. He stated: "you can't buy love, but the Lions clubs do promote a lot of good will between the countries. Our Lions club International president is greeted the world over as a good will ambassador from the United States."

He urged all who were able to attend the convention which will be held in Medford this year, and also the international convention which will be held in San Francisco this year.

Another speaker, who showed the film, "Behind the Trophy," was Cal Giesler, information representative of the State Game Commission. He told of the work of the department in counting the game each year and said that 4,000 miles of census routes are traveled each year in determining the number and condition of the big game. They also check on the feed available for the animals. He said the hunter's choice seasons were allowed because the deer population had been on the increase, and that complaints of deer damage had jumped from 456 in 1952 to 649 in 1956.

Prior to the dinner Lee S. Ross, the club's first president gave a short history of the club and introduced the charter members.

Co. Court Okays Timber Tract for Research Work

Several from this area were in Albany Friday forenoon to attend a slated court hearing relative to the setting aside of a tract of 110 acres of timber in the Rock Creek area as an experimental management project by the research division of the state forestry department.

The meeting was conducted by Alan Berg, research supervisor who will be in charge of the experiment. He pointed out to those present that this research program is designed to determine the most advanced as well as the most economical method of managing the young Douglas fir timber stands of Linn county in order to place them on a sustained yield basis.

A heated debate took place during the meeting, when two individuals argued that the court should not grant the right to log any timber without competitive bid, and that a precedent would be established if this were allowed. It was explained repeatedly that this was not the case, as already there were other like projects in effect now, and they in no way jeopardize competitive bidding in general.

Following the discussion, County Judge Arnold called for a vote, and the result was 13 votes in favor of setting up the research program and only 3 against.

County Judge Arnold informed The Enterprise Wednesday morning that he County Court had just given the project the green light.

Community Survey Taken by Homemaking Students Gives Adult View on Youth of Today

A community survey of adults was taken recently by students of the second period Homemaking class of Santiam Union high school. The survey indicates that local adults consider: disobeying their parents the most serious unlawful act committed by youth. Gang wars and vandalism were rated second and third. The survey indicated that adults felt that the delinquency of youth today is because of parental neglect and lack of affection. Uncensored reading material rated second.

Three to one answered "no" to the question "is the youth of today more delinquent than the youth of a generation ago." In answer to the question, "Are the moral standards of today's youth low?", 70 percent answered no while 25 percent answered, yes.

In answer to the question, "Do you believe that the automobile era has contributed more to delinquency than the 'horse and buggy days' of yesteryear?" there was a slight margin of yes answers over no. The majority of adults believe that cliques in a school were not training groups for later gangs. The majority felt that the parents of our community could do more than they have been doing for our young people by having more planned recreation in the community. Comments made in response to "Do you have any suggestions for the young people who sit back and criticize the youth of today without giving them any help through organizations, churches, schools, etc.?" were too numerous to mention in full, but the following are a few of the comments: "Have more house parties and get-togethers for the young people." "They should keep still or help by starting youth organizations to help the kids." "Look into their own hearts for the answer." "Go see a psychiatrist." "Older people should remember their own youth—then guide instead of criticizing." "Get out and help the kids." "More community recreation is needed outside of school and church. Everybody should help get this started regardless of whether or not they have children of their own. Action, NOT criticism is required."
