Mr. and Mrs. Harold Ayers from Heppner are spending several days at the home of his parents Mr. and Mrs. Art Ayers.

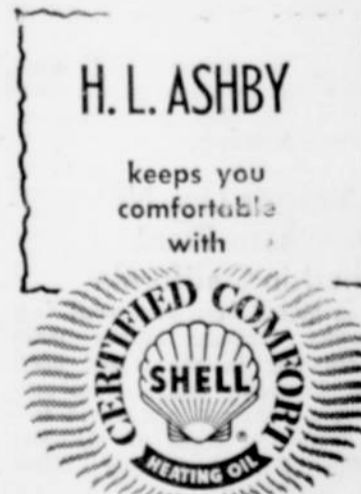
