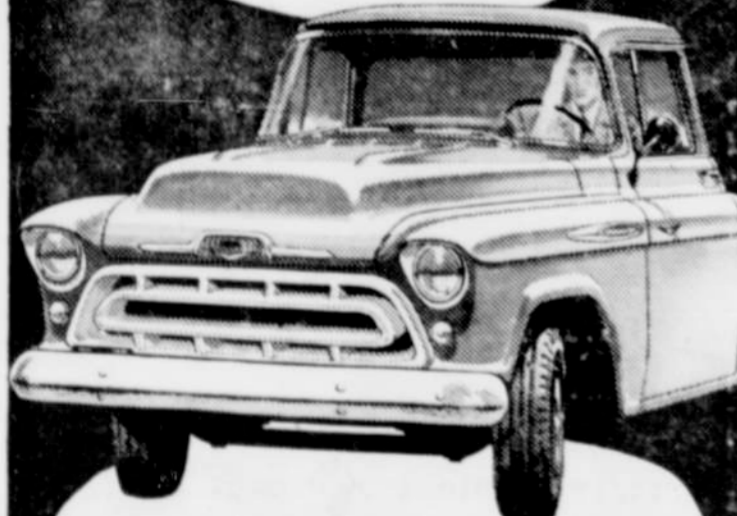

Miss Genevieve Poole of Salem, who visited relatives here during the past weekend and attended the bridal shower of her cousin, Mrs. Dick Corbett (Dolores Poole), Saturday evening, is a teacher at the State School for the Blind. She will travel in Europe this summer as a member of the Oregon College of Education's study tour: "Geography and Related Cultures of the British Isles and Scandinavia."

Miss Poole is a graduate of OCE and began teaching in 1953. Since that time she has done considerable traveling. She has been to Canada and Mexico, and last summer attended the University of Hawaii. Mr. Hawkins died in 1943.

Disabled Vets Must Apply By April 1 To Get Property Tax Exemption

Disabled war veterans and war widows were reminded today that they have only until April 1 to apply for property tax exemptions as provided under state law.

The state Department of Veterans' Affairs, in issuing the warning, said the exemption applies to veterans 40 percent or more disabled, as certified by the federal Veterans Administration or the Armed Forces, and to unremarried widows of war veterans.

The exemption amounts to \$7,500 of the true cash value of the property. Application must be made to the county assessor on or before April 1 each year.

Spanish-American war veterans are entitled to the exemption without having to prove disability.
