Canyon Gets By With No Wrecks Over Holiday

The North Santiam Canyon, as far as reports coming to this office, got off lucky over the long Independence day vacation. Not one accident involving loss of life was reported.

The State as a whole did its share however in building up the annual holiday slaughter. The Oregon toll stood at 14. Drownings took two lives. One was Lester Burselson, 16, of Turner, who drowned while swimming in the Santiam River about 15 miles south of Salem. Other drowning victim was Earl Booth, 23 of Tillamook, who drowned in the ocean at Terra Del Mar beach. The other 11 deaths were charged to traffic accidents.

Perfect weather here was enjoyed by those who stayed in Mill City to take in the second Mill City-Gates celebration. All those who took part in the event were well pleased with the affair.

The beef barbecue which was put on by the American Legion drew a large crowd, and all enjoyed the meat prepared by Ig Etzel of Shaw. This is the second year Etzel has been on hand to help the Legionnaires out in the event.

The Jaycees handled the youth sports program. Highlight was the greased pig chase, which was won by Larry Moberg.

The group enjoyed a ball game put on by two Pee-wee League teams, both being from Mill City. This was just before the Firemen put on their fireworks display. The display was even better than last year and was witnessed by a huge crowd.

Monday night Lions clubbers and others worked at cleaning debris from the city park. The Lions were in charge of bingo and other games during the day and also the food department. They were ably assisted by the Lions Auxiliary in this department. Larry Brent was chief chef again this year, and put in a full shift on the grill.

A good sized crowd went to Gates the night of the third to attend the dance put on by the Gates Volunteer Fire Department.

Cascade Area Scouts to Use Camp Pioneer

DETROIT—Annual summer activities for all Boy Scouts in the Cascade Area Council will begin July 14 at Camp Pioneer.

Camp Pioneer is located seven miles southeast of Marion Forks on the shores of Pine Ridge lake in the Willamette National Forest. The 40-acre camp will operate for five consecutive weeks closing August 17. Each period begins on Saturday and ends on the following Sunday.

New this year at the camp are archery and rifle ranges. The schedule calls for instruction in all scouting skills, handicraft and full aquatics program including boating, swimming, life saving and canoeing. Over night hiking trips are also scheduled. Each week a representative from the Oregon Fish and Wildlife Commission will lecture on the State's forest and river wildlife.

Approximately 125 Boy Scouts and leaders are expected to participate in the camp program each week. Awards will be presented to outstanding Scouts in each division at the end of each period.

Scouts from the Salem area will open activities during the first week. Last reports are that there are still vacant places in the fourth and fifth week periods.

Ernest Podrabsky Gets High Honor from Air Force at Elmendorf Alaska Base

HQ ALASKAN, AIR COMMAND Elmendorf AFB, Alaska, 1 July 57—A former resident of Mill City, Technical Sergeant Ernest L. Podrabsky, USAF, has been named the Outstanding Airman in Alaska for the year 1957. It was announced today by Headquarters Alaskan Air Command.

Sgt. Podrabsky, who was born in Mill City in 1932, will represent his command at the Annual Air Force Association Convention in Washington, D. C., later this month.

The Sergeant is presently serving with the 66th Fighter Interceptor Squadron, a unit of AAC's Tenth Air Division, at Elmendorf AFB, Alaska. He is an Aircraft Maintenance Technician, crew chief on a Northrop F89 Scorpion.

While attending Mill City High School, Sgt. Podrabsky was Student Body President (1949-50) and a four-year letterman in football. He graduated in 1950 and subsequently attended Portland State College for a short time.

As an honored guest at the AFA Convention, Podrabsky will be accorded full VIP honors, along with ranking Air Force officials. This is the second year the AFA has sponsored the Air Force-wide competition to select an Outstanding Airman. The program is designed to create "a better understanding and appreciation of the technician serving in the Air Force."

A glance at the highlights of Sgt. Podrabsky's Air Force career reveals why he was chosen. In a short six and one-half years, the ex-logger has come a long way.

Eight months after entering the service in January, 1951, Sgt. Podrabsky found himself in Korea. When he left, a little more than a year later, Podrabsky was wearing a host of decorations, including the Bronze Star. He won the latter when the F-80 "Shooting Star" for which he was responsible completed 110 combat missions without an abort. Eventually, as a result of the Oregonians mechanical skill, the plane rolled up a record total of 288 combat missions—without an abort in the bunch!

Jim Poole Gets Promotion In Navy at San Diego

A letter was received this week from Jim Poole who is with the Navy in San Diego, Calif. He stated they like it fine down there and that the weather there is not too hot. The Pooles live in the same section of San Diego as the Don Moffatts did at one time, and stated they had driven by the home formerly owned by the Moffatts.

Ed Schroeder Gets Forestry Promotion

Promotion and transfer of high ranking officials in the Salem office of the state forestry department was approved by the board of forestry at its recent meeting in Salem, according to an announcement made by State Forester Dwight L. Phipps.

Edward Schroeder, assistant state forester in charge of the 800,000 acres of state owned forest lands, has been promoted to the office of deputy state forester, a position that has been vacant for some months, and Vance L. Morrison, assistant state forester in charge of the services division, will take over Schroeder's work. The transfer will become effective July 1.

Schroeder, son of Mr. and Mrs. Herb Schroeder of Mill City, attended Oregon State college where he received his degree in forestry. During his undergraduate years he was with the U. S. Forest Service. Prior to that he had been a foreman in one of the Civilian Conservation Corps camps and during the period of 1936 to 1941 was with the woods operation of the Mill City Manufacturing Co., Mill City.

He entered the employ of the State Forestry department in 1941 and was assigned to the Clackamas-Marion Forest Protective association district as an assistant forest inspector. From there he was transferred to Roseburg where he worked successively as inspector, in land management work and as conservation inspector.

Following the 1945 Tillamook fire he was transferred to Forest Grove as District Warden of the 1,500,000-acre state unit. One of the huge tasks that came under his administration was the rehabilitation of the state forest lands within the Tillamook burn. In addition he had the management of some 450,000 acres of state forest lands. He came to Salem in November 1955 to take over as Assistant State Forester in charge of the State Forests division.
